

THE ABOLITION OF THE FRANK ING PRIVILEGE.

The abolition of the Franking priv ilege, so far as relates to the requiring of the Departments to pay postage on the Government business' transacted through the mails, is certainly a silly arrangement. It cannot in the least lessen the expenditures of the Government, but must increase them! The object of the abolition of the Franking privilege was not to increase the expenses of the Departments, but to lessen them. This sweeping provision, of prohibiting the transmission of all free matter, is about as wise and sensible as the man who would charge himself for riding to the depot in his own omnibus. The extra expense of printing stamps, and the other extra work incident to the payment of postage by the Departments, will add no small amount to the current expenses thereof. This is just so much work for nothing, and is like the farmer who would pay to ride in his own wagon. It is hoped that the next session of Congress will look to this matter a litthe more calmly than did the last one. and that the blunders of the law abol ishing the Franking privilege will be corrected. Three amendments are indispensably necessary, one correcting the great mistake made relative to postage on country newspapers within the county where published; the second relative to the free transmission of exchanges between newspapers; the third relative to the payment of postage by the several Departments of the Government.

And we are also of the firm belief that a limited use of the Franking privilege by members of Congress. properly guarded, would not result disastrously. Such a use as would allow of the fullest communication between members and their constituents. Such limited privilege to include the free reception of newspapers by Representatives and Senators, and the sending of letters, not exceeding one ounce in weight, by Congressmen to their constituents free. This limited arrangement would cut off the transportation of all heavy public.docu, ments and other cumbrous matter, which has added so much heretofore to the expense of the Post Office Department. We are well satisfied too, that with such modifications the people would be well pleased, as greater good would result from such an arrangement to the masses than, with the present sweeping prohibitions.

The little town of Michigammi, situated in Marquette County, some thirty-eight miles West of Marquette, was totally destroyed by fire on Thurs-day last. The woods had been on fire to the east of the village and a brisk wind drove the fire into the village. The destruction was swift and complete. One hundred and fifty buildings were burned in a very brief time. Over one hundred families, were left homeless by the fire. The villagers had scarcely time to escape for their lives. Many took to the lake near by, on planks and logs, some were burned and some drowned.

Also the little village of Spur Mine, was swept away by the fires. The total loss of life thus far reported, at the Michigammi and Spur Mine: village conflagrations, is thirty per-. sons. The scene is represented as: heart-rending in the extreme, and had it not been for the copious showers in that region, on Sunday, the horrors of Peshtigo would undoubtedly have been repeated in other villages.

Prompt relief has been furnished the sufferers by the more fortunate in that region, and everything is being done for them that it is possible to do. Never in the history of our country have fires seemed so destructive to human life and property, as during the last two years. With all the improved appliances for the extinguishing of fires, the reports constantly come of a village here and a town there; and the entire business portion of another place, being totally burned up. It seems to matter little whether the weather is wet or dry, if the fire fiend gets once started he stops not his rav-ages till the town is destroyed. It seems that there must be some peculiar state or condition of the atmosphere or something else peculiarly adapted to the feeding and spreading of the flames. These 'frequent , and extensive fires are 'alarming fire 'un derwriters throughout the country to such an extent, that it has been seriously contemplated, by some of the best companies in the land, whether it

for some such cases, at the County's charge, of course is all correct. I will simply say that this is an infamous slander, and a poor and mean argument-just fitting to build his own narrow-contracted view upon-to "throw the doctoring of the poor upon the medi-cal fraternity." What would the gro-cer say to an attempt to throw the poor man's grocery bill upon him. The grocer has no better claim to re-muneration than the physician whose' services are of solid worth and merit. The physician's charges are not exorbitant. Physicians are generally a class of men of better talent than our merchants, and with just as much invested do not increase in wealth at a more rapid pace. It is the demand, and an ability to meet that demand, that regulates the price. A physician's visit, or prescription, is worth what he asks. for it as well as the grocer's
