Quite a number of ladies and gentlemen assembled in the Farmers' Club room, Buchanan, Tuesday afternoon, to listen to an address from Mr. O. L. King, an authorized speaker in behalf of the Farmers' Granges.

The Union Farmers' Club met at Roe's Hall Saturday July 20. As the Secretary failed to put in his appearance until the meeting was about ready to adjourn, we are unable to give a proper report of our proceedings.

It was argued by Dr. Roe, and generally concurred in that farmers can secure the best results at present, from their farms by going in pretty heavily to the dairy business.
