"A nimble sixpence is better than a slow shilling" or even a slow dollar at this time. It is wonderful to contemplate what debts can be paid and commodities purchased by a five dollar note that is rapidly exchanging hands, even in a single day: It is no time to hoard upmoney. If you have any money the public need it. The business and commercial interests of the world demand that you should not lock it up, but that you send it out and that it should float briskly from one person to another, liquidating debts, purchasing necessaries, forwarding enterprises, increasing, stimulating and encouraging in a thousand different ways business operations of every description. People should not forget small debts. If it, and let that dollar help pay off some larger debts. Keep the ball moving. You who desire to become rich let your riches be in valuables and accumulation of property, but not by deposits of money (the representatives of value) for private use and benefits exclusively.

Notwithstanding the money panic, from which the country has been suffering for some time past, the current of foreign trade and especially the export trade has not been seriously interrupted. Taking into consideration the obstacles that have been in the grabs, develops a new country at a way during the past month, it is re-markable that the exports from the port at New York reached in one week to the value of \$7,025,771. 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
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
