

The day has come when some-must be wrought out to overmust be wrought out to over-the on the great freight monopolies of the present day. Let justice to all parties be the watchword, to the rail-road as well as to the agriculturalist. Justice to all cannot injure any great interest or industry of the country. Such legislation as will secure elas-ticity of the bank circulation is impertant, and needs the most careful tention of Congress. It is evident with people of the West at least, that some system must be adopted whereby the currency may be expand-ed sufficiently to transact the business of the country. To our mind there cannot be the least objection to a system of banking, on the same basis as our National banks with the same securities, whereby one capitalist may have the same right as any other captalist to engage in that business. The reat law of demand and supply will

igulate the volume of currency the me as any other business is regulatthereby. A system also of the in-rchangability of bonds for green-tcks, and *vice versa*, would doubtless ork both good to the government and . the business interests of the coun-

The Spanish-Guban difficulty will ubtless engross the attention of ongress upon its assembling. Thether war results therefrom or not. ie subject of the increase of the Na-y of this country will need the seriis attention of our National Legislaire. The people generally, we opine, re now ready to grant the necessity f so increasing our Navy that we lay at any time be in a condition to nforce respect to our flag on the igh seas.

The subject of establishing postal avings banks will doubtless receive a roper share of attention. The plan eported as advocated by Post Master teneral Cresswell, will meet the ap-roval of the people generally. If he best interests of the country are onsidered, Congress will doubtless on inaugurate some vstem of Postal Savings banks, wheren the laboring classes can deposit vith security their spare earnings. The result to the government will be loan of no inconsiderable amount at a low rate of interest, and the increasng of the interest of the laboring classes in the stability of the governnent: Last but not least, the Forty-Third Congress will be called upon to right the wrong that the last Congress perpetrated on the people and the country press. The injustice of requiring weekly newspapers to pay postage in the Counties where published, is so patent that it needs no argument to demonstrate it. This act is a thrust at the mouth pieces of the great mass of the people, and is strongly resented by them. The act is one looking to the building up of the great newspapers of the cities and the crushing out of the country press. The people look at it in this light, and will remember the Senator or Representative who uses his influence for the perpetuation of this great injustice. The Republican majority of Congress will have no small responsibility resting upon their shoulders. If they would maintain the perpetuation of Republican rule it is of the first importance that the mistakes of past legislation be corrected, and the pledges of the party faithfully fulfilled to continue to inaugurate the reforms and economy of administration so much demanded by the people. The notes of warning have been sounded in the recent elections, and the wise will give heed thereto, but the foolish will jest till the storm comes. With a wise course pursued by the Forty-Third Congress the future success of the Republican party my be assured, but with reckless legislation and a bold defiance of the wishes of the people, its destiny will be sealed.



## THE CUBAN QUESTION.

It is now thought in the best informed circles that there will be no war with Spain on account of the Virginius matter. It is asserted from official circles that Spain is disposed to make due reparation for the outrage committed by the Cuban authorities. But the Spanish government asks time, so that she may fully inform herself of the exact state of the case. Of course our government could not, on the profession of Spain to make all due reparation, refuse to grant so reasonable a request. Notwithstanding the prospect of a pacific solution of the difficulty between the two nations, our government is not abating in the least the rapid preparation of our Navy for active service. This is as it should be, so that in case the difficulty is not properly and satisfactorily adjusted, the United States will be in the best possible condition to enforce her demand. It is further rumored that Spain will propose, in case a satisfactory agreement cannot be arrived at between the two powers, to leave the


