

The veto of this bill has caused no little excitement throughout the country, some approving, and others strongly condemning the action of the President. That the veto surprises both the friends and opposers of the movement, there is no doubt. It was thought that the Executive would not disapprove of any measure passing Congress after such long discussion as was had on this Financil measure, he having long since proclaimed that he had no policy of his own, but the will of the people.

While we deeply regret that President Grant could not see his way clear to the approval of the Increase of the Currency Bill, we would not for a
