THE VETO.

The President after duly considering the Senate Currency Bill returned it without his approval.

While we deeply regret that President Grant could not see his way clear to the approval of the increase of the Currency Bill, we would not for a moment call his sincerity in question.

Let the friends of the poor man, the friends of the mechanic, the friends of the business man and manufacturer, in Congress continue to press the necessity of so increasing the currency that the interests of the great mass of the people of the United States shall be subserved.

The Detroit Post says of the veto: "The veto by President Grant of the inflation bill, has been so conducted as to exhibit clearly several of the most striking qualities which consti-

ture the greatness of his character - his unobtrusive common-sense; his patient but silent investigation; his openness in listening to advice from all quarters, but reticence in keeping back his own opinions; his firmness and decision at the crisis; his determination that the country and the people shall suffer no harm; his calm boldness in facing any opposition, however formidable, which stands across the path of his duty.

The Chicago Inter-Ocean says of the veto: "No President of the long succession can justly be said to have more clearly discerned the will of the people, and generally to have more scrupulously obeyed it, than U. S. Grant. His message to the country, in his first inaugural, that he should have 'no policy to enforce against the will of the people,' his abandonment of the project of the annexation of San Domingo, notwithstanding his judgment approved it, with a graceful allusion to his original pledge, and his course of uniform deference to the popular voice, have combined greatly to strengthen the public confidence in his superior judgment and devoted loyalty to the principles of our representative form of government.

Practically it is a question whether the measure would give an additional dollar to the irredeemable paper currency of the country or not, and whether by requiring three-fourths of the reserve to be retained by the banks, and prohibiting interest to be received on balances, it might not prove a contraction.

NEEDED ACTION OF CONGRESS BEFORE ADJOURNMENT

The country demands of Congress that something should be done to meet the great demands and needs of the South and West, and also for the whole country.

Let the friends of the poor man, the friends of the mechanic, the friends of the business man and manufacturer, in Congress continue to press the necessity of so increasing the currency that the interests of the great mass of the people of the United States shall be subserved.

These three important measures at least should receive the serious attention and action of the National Legislature before the adjournment of Congress.
