

#### PATENT RIGHTS.

(ireat injustice has been done heretofore by the extension of patents granting the exclusive rights to the use of certain inventions to persona after they had become extensively enriched by the tribute already paid to them by the people, creating in many instances the most oppressive monopolies that exist in the world. This is a subject in which all are interested. and one in regard to which the people have spoken in a manner that is determined and which is likely to produce good results. During the present session of ('ongress only two cases of extension of patent rights have been granted, and these in cases of no great importance, and where the ex tensions were manifestly just.

There is danger in applying the remedy to any of these existing evils of doing as great injury in some other direction as the one intended to be avoided. There are generally two extremes and the only safe position is to occupy middle-ground between the two. No one objects to a law that encourages inventive skill, and that will properly reward the inventor of any machine or design that is a real benefit to mankind. A law that would not do this would be even more objectionable than the law that would grant a perpetual exclusive right in any invention. A bill was introduced into Congress during the early part of the present session, by Hon. Henry Sayler, of Indiana, which proposes to abolish the whole monopoly feature of the present patent laws, and allow any person under proper restrictions to manufacture and sell any patented article on payment of a royalty of ten per cent., to the owner or inventor. Congress has been petitioned by over 40,000 persons to pass this bill, among whom are over 100 inventors who speak in the highest commendation of such a law. The bill has been ably criticised and thoroughly discussed, but is constantly growing in favor. It is claimed that this bill, if it comes into full effect, will save annually to con-

sumers at least \$20,000,000 and at the same time encourage and reward inventive skill to a greater extent than our present laws. It is a fact that under our present system the inventor frequently is not the man who is profited or benefited, but rewards beyond anything that is just or reasonable build up and enrich huge monopolies. 

THE SWING TRIAL.

The importance of an ecclesiastical trial now proceeding in Chicago is such that we will give a brief account of it to our readers. Professor Swing, n Presbyterian divine, is charged with heresy and disloyalty to the faith and doctrines of the Presbyterian Church. The Presbyterian Church doubtless believes that the entire Bible is the inspired word of God. The question is, does Professor Swing accept this belief fully and without qualifications? His own language shows that he cannot, and that the theory he advocates cannot harmonize with the creed to which he claims to adhere, as they are at variance and inconsistent one with the other. Speaking of the 109th Psalm he says:

"They had a temporary significance, depending altogether upon the kind of work the Hebrews had to perform. If it was necessary for them to go to battle, it was desirable that they should have a battle song-a Marseillaise. If their hands must do bloody work they were entitled to sing a terrific psalm. But the moment the Hebrew method of life ceased, that moment the 109th Psalm lost its value. For

as the bloody Hebrew war is over, so

is its battle song. There is no logic

in perpetuating a war-cry after the

war itself has passed away." Professor Patton, who is prosecuting this trial, says that "it concerns all, and is of special moment to the orthodox Christians. I am not speaking for old-school or new-school Presbyterians, nor for Methodists, Baptists or Congregationalists, but for the whole evangelical world, whose faith is threatened." In a speech two and one-halt days in length he denounces the course taken by Professor Swing, and exposes the danger of allowing too great a latitude in the interpretation of the Scriptures. The Bible contains the foundation of the religious faith, and as soon as people begin to question its divine origin, and drift away from its teachings, to that extent they launch the Christian world out on a sea of doubt and uncertainty. While this is the tendency of a theory that is too liberal and sceptical, the doctrine that the entire Bible, according to the popular ren-dering, is inspiration, and that every word in it is the word of God, often begets unbelief and infidelity. Prof. Swing maintains that such a doctrine taxes the credulity of an intelligent person to an extent that is unreasonable and unwarrantable. No person, he claims, can reconcile some of the sentiments and passages of the Bible with a correct idea of Deity and His attributes. If this be true, the ground taken by Professor Swing is the only one short of an unbelief in the Bible altogether.

According to the formulated doctrine and established creed of the Presbytery Professor Swing is, without a doubt, guilty of the charges made against him. And many others of our ablest ministers, both of the Presbyterian and other religious denominations, are subject to the same
