

### "Spirits and Spiritualists."

Some stir in spiritual circles has been made, and general interest in the subject renewed everywhere, by the testimony of Mr. Alfred Wallace, Darwin's rival, if not his anticipating, discoverer of the doctrine of natural selection. Mr. Wallace announces his conversion\_to the belief, if not exactly in the doctrines, at least in the phenomena, of Spiritualism, and his inability to explain them on any other ground. In addition to Wallace, the prominent men of science, art, literature, politics, and some eminent theologians also in Great Britain and this country. Doubtless if the individual cases could be sifted the claim would be proved to be exaggerated, amounting in many instances to nothing more than a willingness to accept the reality of the phenomena and to confess that these cannot be explained by any known scientific facts and laws. But

Peas for Seed.

Peas sown early are apt to escape being punctured by the species of curculio which produces the pea weevil. It is said that if the peas, after being thoroughly dry, are placed in bottles, corked tight and sealed, and hung in the sun, the larvæ will be destroyed. If a small pinch of sulphur be placed in the bottle, it will assist, or if the bottle be filled with carbonic acid gas, it certainly will kill them, this would be rather difficult, unless proper means for so doing were at hand. How can this be if these primary meetings are neglected and not attended. We tell farmers and all others, if they want men put in nomination who will represent their views. and interests, they must properly con-sider the importance of attending these mass meetings and selecting as delegates men who are known to reflect the judgment and sentiment of a ma-jouty of those in attendance, and men who will not feel indifferent about performing the duties intrusted to them, but will take an active part in the work delegated to them, and by their influence and vote aim to have the views and wishes of their constit.

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EDENBURG, July 9, 1874. EDITOR RECORD: -We have been visited by another of those heart-rending accidents, which casts a gloom over the entire community, and which of late years have become more frea kind that our fruit growers and their families seldom have the pleasure of witnessing. The facts as we learn them are about as follows: A gentleman who hails from Buchanan, travels about the country with a certain patent. This gentleman has a wife, also, of course a resident of Buchanan, and his wife is a stunner, quent in the Oil Regions than any other part of the country, arising from the use of nitro-glycerine. The vic-tim of this accident in question was a young man, aged twenty-three, by the name of John Osborn, and in the emsloy of a prominent torpedo company. On the evening of the 26th, Osborn started from Emlenton with six cans of Glycerine, or one hundred and fifty pounds, which he intended to deliver at Petrolia, some seventy miles distant. Darkness overtaking him, he concluded to remain at Parker through the night. From this time nothing is known of his movements. 'I clip the following from the Oil City Daily Derrick :

"He was called early in the morn-ing, but refused to partake of any breakfast, being overly anxious to arrive at Petrolia to meet his appoint-ments, Obtaining a horse and buckboard, he started from Parker over the roughest road that was possible, although it is conjectured by his friends he came that way to make time, as it is the nearest route. He

had crossed Bear Creek and was over a hundred feet up the south slope of the hill when the explosion occurred. Opinions differ widely as to what made the glycerine explode, but the most reliable information is mere conject-ure, as the exact cause will forever re-main a mystery. It is therefore left for us to surmise it received some violent shock, the only true cause why this most dangerous of compounds can be made to explode. The road at this point was extremely rough, and it would be next to an impossibility to convey glycerine over it, unless in a frozen state.


