Home Carpentry.

Very often a screw hole gets so worn that a screw will not stay in. When glue is handy, the regular carpenter makes the hole larger and glues in a large plug making a nest for an entirely new hole. But this is not always the case, and people without tools, and in an emergency, often have to fit the thing at once. Generally leather is used but this is so hard that it does not hold well. The best of all is to cut narrow strips of cork, and fill the hole completely. Then force the screw in. This will make as tight job as it is driven into

an entirely new bole.

NEW STYLE OF COOPERAGE.—A new barrel is being made in New York State. The entire sides of the barrel are to be made of a single stave. Those staves are to be made from a section of a log cut the length of a barrel, thoroughly steamed and then placed in a powerful machine, which shaves it into a long ribbon, like the unrolling of a piece of wall paper. The practice of the Government, guaranteeing the payment of Railroad Bonds, has proven to be a very expen-sive and unsafe business. Already the Government has issued bonds to the amount, interest and all, of over \$80,000,000. The understanding was at the time of issuing these bonds, that when the roads were completed 5 percent. of their earnings should apply as payment on the bonds. The facts are that these companies, after having their roads built at the expense of the Government, have not only failed to pay the money back into the National Treasury, but have also neglected to pay any part of the interest on these bonds. At the last session of Congress the Secretary of the Treasury was directed, by a joint resolution, to make a formal demand of the Pacific Railways that are now owing the Government over \$3,000,-000, as the five per cent. of their next earnings, and on refusal, the Auditor General was instructed to commence snit against the companies for the amount.
