Indians who have made settlements and improvements in the Marquette district, on section ten, of township forty-seven north, range two cast, and section twenty-four, of township forty-seven north, range three west, are permitted to enter eighty acres each, at Marquette, at the minimum price of one dollar and a quarter an acre, entries to be made before March 3d, 1876.

EDITORIRIAL COMMENTS.

Suit has ugain been brought against "Boss" Tweed for \$6,000,000. He was arrested on Wednesday of last week, and his bail set at \$3,000,060. This suit is brought to recover money paid out under the Board of Audit of 1870. Tweel is now serving his sentence on conviction of having paid out some of this money, and his conviction on these charges will be an easy matter. Tweed is bound to pass the remainder of his days "where the dogs won't bite him."

The Black Hills excitement has revived the mining interest in the Southern States. At present some six or eight good stamp mills are constantly at work in Georgia alone. The work is principally done with a pam, and those engaged in the work usually make from \$6 to \$8 per day. No fortunes are made instantly, but the returns are sure and pay reasonably well. Georgia will export this year over \$300,000 worth of copper and iron.

The Methodist Churches of Philadelphia closed their doors recently because of a dissatisfaction among the members in reference to the ministers assigned to them by the Conference. This practice of delegating the authority to a few of selecting ministers to preside over different congregations has existed much longer than many predicted it would. It has been subinitted to rather reluctantly in many of our large cities, and there is evidently a growing desire to have it abol-ished, so that each church or congregation can chose its own pastor.
