

MUNICIPAL DEBTS.

The following table has been pub-lished, showing the population and indebtedness of seventeen of our principal cities as last reported :

Population in 1870. Debt. Albany, N. Y...69,422 \$ 2,700,000 Louisville.....100,753 New Orleans...191,418 New York......942,292 Philadelphia....674,022 Providence68,904 San Francisco. 149.478

Whenever the people of this village begin to gramble about high taxes the study of the above table might afford them some comfort. The rate of debt in San Francisco is \$23 to each inhabitant; Albany \$40; St. Louis, \$50; Ohicago, \$55; Cincinnati, \$75; Providence, \$75; Pittsburg; \$80; Philadelphia, \$90; Brooklyn, \$95; Louisville, \$100; New Orleans, \$110; Baltimore, \$115; Boston, \$130; New York, \$140; Portland, \$160; Jersey City, \$165; and Washington, \$240 to every man, woman and child in the District.

The plan of creating a heavy burdensome debt for public improvements is one that has been generally practiged by the municipal authorities throughout the country. There are emergencies that would seem to justify this course, but as a rule it is both unwise and inexpedient to attempt to advance the interests or welfare of any community in this way. It is wrong for an individual to encumber his property to secure money unless his, chances for investment are such that he can repay the amount with accumulating interest by the excess in his income by reason of such investment. What is true of individuels is true of a corporation. Not a township, village, city or county in this State should be in debt, or no debt should be created without the ability to rapidly discharge it without imposing heavy taxes.

The taxes which we pay in this village are light in comparison with the taxes paid in other localities, yet our taxes would be greatly reduced if we had no interest to pay annually upon our debt. Wisdom dictates that a strong effort should be made to dis-





POLYGAMY.

The first conviction for bigamy or polygamy in Utah, under the United States law of 1862 for punishing such crimes in the Territories, was had at the last term of the District Court. The case was appealed to the Supreme Court, and it is the intention to carry the case to the Supreme Court of the United States. The Supreme Court of the Territory has decided that the conviction under the District Court was null and void from the fact that the grand jury was composed of twenty-three instead of fifteen jurors, as required by the statutes of that Territory:

Had the jury been composed of less than the required number the conviction would without a doubt be held invalid in all the courts, but the fact that there were eight more jurors than contemplated by the law, would seem to afford no sufficient reason why the conviction should not stand. At any rate it is hoped that the case will be carried to the United States Supreme Court, as a decision of that tribunal would necessarily touch other important points in the case. Sooner or later this question must be met, and some law be enacted that will give the Government absolute and unrestricted control of this evil which prevails so extensively and defiantly in this nation at present. There is no excuse for dealing with this matter with indifference or timidity: The strong arm of the Government should be invoked to blot out this curse from our land, and every means used for its speedy and complete destruction.






