Utica, N. Y., says the Herald of that city, some russet apples grown a year ago, attracted attention. The apples were plump, fresh, and of good flavor; quite as good as the same kind of apples are ordinarily, on the approach of spring. The apples had been put up in refuse boxes obtained in the groceries, and in the following manand they had shut the door to keep it ner: A layer of dry sawdust was sprinkled at the bottom of the box, and then a layer of apples placed in it so that they do not touch each other. Upon this was placed a layer of sawdust, and so on till the box was filled. The boxes, after being packed in this way, were placed on the wall in the cellar, up from the ground, where they kept perfectly, retaining their freshness and flavor until brought out and exhibited at the fair. To Keep Gate-Posts From Sagging, Various contrivances are adopted

for this purpose. Stones are rammed into the hole; flat stones placed against the inner face, etc. The simplest, easiest, and best way is thus explained: The hole is dug like a ditch, say six or seven feet in the direction in which the gate hangs. Set in the post about the middle of the oblong hole. Place a piece of timber about three feet long firmly against the bottom, from the gate. Fill in the earth'and pound it hard and solid, especially around the horizontal stick of timber. When the hole is about two-thirds filled, place another

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


