

"I desire to submit a currency platform upon which every leading politi cian of this county, if they were honest enough to confess the truth, would be found to stand:

WHEREAS, Such contraction of the legal-tender currency as will bring it on to apar, or within two or three per cent. thereof, with gold, is the only possible means toward successful resumption; and,

WHEREAS, There is no Presidential candidate, nor any friend of any candidate who dares advocate contraction at this period; therefore, be it

Resolved, That both parties shall put the specie resumption question as far as possible out of the present campaign, and leave it for the determination of the next Congress. HARD MONEY MAN.

The Democratic Liberal party of Connecticut met in assembly at New Haven, Feb. 23, and adopted a hard money platform, three planks of which read as follows:

Sixth-The only currency known to the Constitution of the United States is gold and silver, and coin forms the only stable basis for the commercial necessities of the world. The Democratic party of the Union has never failed to recognize and support this essential principle, but, fol lowing the great "and costly war we find an irredeemable currency at our doors. It is, therefore, the duty of Congress to adopt such measures as shall lead to the early resumption of specie payments, while guarding its acts by that prudence which the instincts of the commercial, manufacturing and industrial pursuits imperatively_demand.

Seventh-That the act of the last Congress passed by a Republican ma jority declaring that there shall be specie payments on the first day of January, 1879, was a scheme of mere party expediency, supported by no measure to secure resumption. It was a deception and a fraud. Its results have been injurious, as the business interests of the country could not be shaped and conducted to harmonize with an ineffective and deceptive act. We respectfully ask Congress to substitute for it well defined and practical legislation, tending to the accumulation of coin as a basis for resumption and the funding and cancellation of a portion of the greenback circulation in a convertible bond, bearing a low rate of interest.

the past two years, land has risen very rapidly in market, and the choice locations are now commanding high prices, depending mainly upon quality of soil, distance from market, the facilities for irrigation, &c. I found desirable, improved farms, favorably located, selling as high as \$200 per acre. In other localities from \$50 to

\$100. In the vicinity of Santa Cruz, seventy miles south of San Francisco by water, land is worth from \$25 to \$75 and \$100 per acre; these prices being very much modified by the character of the improvements and dis-

tance from the town. In my somewhat hurried visit to Santa Cruz, I was not able to learn as much on this point as I wished, but I am being furnished with real estate items, by a friend of mine, from time to time. But, considering the rapidly growing importance of this town, I found real estate very low, but with an upward tendency, many pieces of property in and near town, having doubled in price within the last twelve months. Yet town property, improved and unimproved, is lower than in Buchanan or Niles. At Los Angelos, the other extremity of the State, (although I did not visit this locality) the summers are intensely hot, dry and dreary, depending wholly upon irrigation for everything that grows out of the ground; besides all kinds of timber and building material is very scarce. Now in regard to Santa Cruz none

of the above is true, as you will find by consulting the map, Santa Cruz lies between these extremes. Cold, damp and foggy weather is but seldom known there. In front is the broad Pacific and the Coast Range forming a background. The cool and bracing atmosphere from them, modified by the warm, fresh and balmy breezes from the ocean, renders the climate here uniform, equable and delightful. It has none of these disagreeable fogs nor intensely hot days. Besides, I was informed by my friend (by the way a gentleman from Wisconsin, and reliable) that good crops can be raised there without irrigation, (in fact I saw no evidences of irrigation) and even without heavy spring

rains, so necessary in other parts of the State. The very heavy dews deposited during the nights, supply all this deficiency, so that in this vicinity all kinds of cereals and fruits flourish, which is not true of many other parts of the State.

Again, there are other advantages tere which Eastern people are sure to appreciate. Such as an abundance of the finest wood and biulding timber, growing on the western slope of the Coast range, and within easy access of this place. I never saw finer specimens of timber in any country. Stone, brick, lime, and all kinds of building material in abundance, and cheaper than in Southern Michigan. There are also hundreds of living streams of pure soft water coming down from the mountains, adding to the stock-raising facilities of this section. Dairy farms were numerous; cheese factories were found here, for the first time in my entire trip over the State. The foot hills are finely adapted to the growth of grapes, and many a vineyard greets the eye of the traveler through those hills. 
It is now considered certain that the Government will soon begin the isue of silver coin in the place of our present fractional paper currency being destroyed as fast as it is redeemed in silver. At present silver in bullion is worth a trifle less than greenbacks, as compared with gold, so that the Government will make an actual profit by coining it. And silver is still falling slowly; so that Dr. Landerman, Director of the Mint, thinks that, so long as gold is below 118, silver cannot be exported at a profit


over coining it. If gold should rise above that figure, however, after silver coin have again come into general use, there will be no danger of the silver coin from circulation and exported in any amount, because silver coin will be an absolute necessity for small change; and, being the only small change the country will have, after the paper factional currency is withdrawn, the silver coin will be worth more as change than it can sell for as bullion. Instead of being exported in large quantities, in case gold should rise above 120, after enough should be exported to make change a little scarce, there would be a premium for silver change at home, which would keep him in the country. The small silver coin, once in circulation, cannot be again driven out by anything short of a new issue of a fractional paper currency; and the country, if it once gets rid of fractional paper currency, will never again re-turn to it until other generations have grown up who cannot remember the experience this generation has had with fractional paper. The
