It MUST HAVE BEEN BUT IS NOT. —The Constitutional Amendment relative to the salary of Circuit Judges was carried in the State by 279 majority. In this county the same amendment was defeated by 1,476 majority, but the vote of this county, on the Constitutional Amendment, was not returned to the State Board of Canvassers in time for their consideration. The Board met at Lansing last week, declared the result of the vote, and have gone to their respective homes. Had the vote of this county been returned in proper season the majority would have been 1,197 the other way, which would have materially changed the looks of things.

SOLD AGAIN. —A few days since a sharper called upon Mr. DeBert Bliss, of Niles township, and managed, by a good use of a slippery tongue, to sell him a lot of beaver and other cloths, in patterns, for which he gave his note. After the sharper had gone and Mr. Bliss had time to more closely examine his purchase, he found that he had been taken in and done for to the tune of about twenty-five dollars. Mr. Bliss has probably come to the conclusion that it is better and cheaper to buy of responsible dealers, and let all traveling hucksters severely alone. Another interesting feature of the present game is that a citizen of this place went along to help to swindle his neighbors.

ACCIDENT. —Venable Marrs, who lives on the Lybrook farm, near James Wilson's side-track, about two miles west of Dayton, was struck by the engine of a freight train, near his home early Saturday morning. He had been away, furnishing music for a party, and in returning home happened to be on the railroad at the point of meeting of two freight trains, and in getting away from one, was struck by the other. He received a severe flesh wound in the head, a gash about four or five inches in length being cut in the scalp on the left side of the head. He was taken to Dayton in an insensible condition and the wound dressed by Dr. Neal. Up to Tuesday morning, Marrs was still unconscious and fears entertained that the injuries will yet prove fatal.

[St. Joseph Traveler and Herald.] A dispatch from Grand Rapids of last Friday, says: "In the United States Court to-day a demurrer to the Board of Supervisors of Berrien county to levy a tax to pay a judgment on railroad bonds against several townships in that county was sustained." 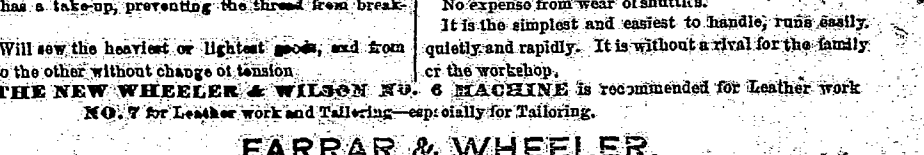
