

Antiquity of the World.

At the annual session of the Liverpool Geography Society, which occurred in October, the retiring President, Mr. F. Millard Reads, read a paper treating of the yearly amount of solid matter removed from the surface of England and Wales by rain, or rather river-water. By elaborate calculations the writer estimated that it would require 13,000 years to remove one foot from the whole surface in the way indicated. The calculations were compared with others showing-the denudation of the great river basins of Enrope, viz: The Rhine, Rhone, and Danube. From these estimates Mr. Reade deduced the conclusion that the minimum amount of time which has elapsed since the first known sedimentary rocks were deposited is, in round numbers, 500,000,-000 of years. This conclusion harmonizes with the views of Lvell. Hutton, and others, as to great age of the world.

Not one of them could bstand the shot of Armstrong gut 10 12 with 341 pounds of powder, but the Schneider's steel plates, thoug hey broke up, stopped the projects from quiet piercing the backing, we sreas the targets covered with wrought iron plates were completely pierced, leaving large ragged holes. The shots had enough velocity remaining to have knocked out plates on the other side of the ship, and would have carried complete ruin into the interior. Those which failed to pierce the steelclad target would have shaken the whole structure and caused a leak. Seven hundred and fifty thousand pounds sterling of specie was with-drawn from the Bank of England Nov. 28 for shipment to the United States.

The New York Times says that several lots of fire arms, consisting of rifles, pistols and field pieces, have been sold from that State to parties in South Carolina. The Times mentions one firm having sold over 1,500 pieces more than is usual.

During the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1876, 4,007,817 registered lctters passed through the United States mail, the fees for which amounted to \$335,416.60. Of this enormous number only 1,049, or one to every 4,000 were lost by different causes.
