

ANOTHER RAILROAD HORROR.

Probably the most horrible railroad accident ever known in this country, accurred on the Michigan Southern and Lake Shore road, near Ashtabula, Ohio, December 30th. At about S in the evening, just after the Western-bound passenger express had pulled out of the station at Ashtabula, the iron bridge spanning the creek at that point gave away, and the entire train, consisting of eleven cars, and bearing 200 passengers, was precipitated seventy-five feet to the ice-covered surface below. The weather being intensely cold, and the wrecked cars taking fire immediately, the horrors of death by freezing and burning were added to the appalling accident, and many who were not fatally injured by the fearful fall were either burned or frozen to death before they could be rescued. Friends of those who were either

known or expected to have been en board the ill-fated train, are rushing from all parts of the country to the scene of the disaster, many to find their friends either entirely consumed in the flames, or so mutilated as to be unrecognizable. Among the killed are' Miss Mary Burchard, of Fayetteville, Vermont, cousin of President elect Hayes, P. P. Bliss, a noted musical composer of Chicago, and others.

MICHIGAN LEGISLATURE.

The Senate and House of Representatives of our State have convened, holding short sessions yesterday. The business transacted was principally swearing in the new members and electing officers. Hereafter the daily sessions will commence at 10 o'clock A. M. To-day the retiring Governor delivers his retiring message, and to-morrow Gov. Crosswell delivers his inaugural message. It is said that both documents are entirely devoted to State matters.

Ferry was unanimously renominated by acclamation by a rising vote, which insures his re-election. ### Fighting the Curculio.

As most people know, the chief reason why the plum is not raised is from the attacks of ths curculio. It nunctures the fruit to deposit an egg, and just before the time of ripening the plum rots. Where plums can be raised they are very profitable, just because so many cannot have them.

A correspondent of the Ohio Farmer states that he kept a plum tree from curculios by sprinkling the ground under the tree with corn meal. This induced the chickens to scratch and search. The meal was strewn every morning from the time the trees blossomed until the fruit was large enough to be out of danger. The consequence was that the fowls picked up the curculios with the meal,

and the tree, being saved from the presence of the insects, was wonderfully fruitful.

There seems to be a grain of good sense in this little item, and for this reason we have plucked it out of the great sea of exchanges where it has been floating about and would soon have been lost.-Philadelphia Press.

HOW TO FEED POULTY .- The Massachsetts Ploughman says: --"Don't feed poultry corn; for laying hens it is worse than valueless, there is so much fattening material in its composition and so little of the albuminous, that eggs cannot be manufactured from it. For their breakfast a dry dough of shorts is sufficient; if you have some skim milk to mix with it, all the better. A good supply of oats and barley should be kept in the feeding box through the day, and at night a feed of whole wheat should be given them. Corn should be given them only in the cold weather, and then sparingly, for the last meal of the day.'

HOW TO GROW PLANTS FROM SLIPS. -This question is asked in a discussion to the American Institute substiantially as follows: "We must always bear in mind that a high temperature is necessary to grow plants from slips. They will seldom strike roots when the thermometer marks below sixty degrees, and that it probably why so many fail. The best material to start cuttings of any kind is in clean washed sand. If in the ground, make a hole an inch or two across and fill it with sand. Grape propagators use nothing but sand and water at first. When roots start, the cuttings are changed to other pots filled with rich compost.



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CURE FOR CHOKING CATTLE. ---Should cattle be at any time in danger of choking by reason of any foreign substance sticking in the throat, take of fine chewing tobacco enough to make a ball the size of a hen's egg; dampen it with molasses so that it can be compressed into a ball, and will adhere closely; elevate the animal's head, pull out the tongue and crowd the ball as far down the throat as possible. In fifteen minutes it will cause sickness and vomiting, relaxing the muscles so that the potato, or whatever might be choking it, will be thrown up.

LINCOLN CAKE .--- Cream one pound of sugar and three-fourths pound of butter together; add the yolk of six well-betten eggs, two cupfuls soda dissolved in a little boiling water and stirred into it just before adding to the cake; one teaspoonful each of nutmeg and cinnamon, and one pound "", "ift; flour, one tablespoonful rose "", "ift; half a pound citron cut and ", zged with flour, and lastly the "hites of the eggs, which must be beaten very stiff before being added; then beat all thoroughly and bake in

square shallow pans.

FINE MINCEMEAT.-To one pound of unsalted ox tongue, boiled tender, or one pound of good beef, add two pounds beef suet, chopped fine, two pounds stoned raisins, two pounds, ourrants, two pounds good apples. two and one-half pounds fice sugar, one-half or three-quarters pounds candied orange, lemon, and citron; the grated rind of two large lemons, two nutmegs, dessert spoonful of powdered mace, the same of powdered ginger, and one-half pint best syrup. Press closely into jars, and keep well covered. In a few days it will be fit to use, but will keep good for several weeks.

APPLE PUDDING .- Make a good paste, roll it out and place in a basin rubbed with dripping; press out the plaits so that the crust may be of an equal thickness all round; peel and cut up four large apples, put half of them in, then add one tablespoonful of moist sugar and one of cloves; put in the rest of the apples; cover the top well over with paste; press it down, that the water may not get in ; tie a cloth over; put it into boiling water and boil fast two hours and a half, if the crust be made of suct ; take off the cloth, pass a knife around the edge of the basin. Turn out the pudding carefully when sending it to tables.




