Until the 9th day of last November he found no one willing to accept as true his seemingly visionary theory, but having secured a suitable patient for experimental purposes in the person of M. Nathan Isaacs, a near relative, by the way, of Baron Rothschild, he immediately proceeded to demonstrate the truth or his hither to unsubstantial assertions. Mr. Isaacs was dying of an anamic disord-

er, and having heard of Dr. d'Alembert's theory, he sent for him on the date above mentioned, having dis charged his family physician, and placed himself wholly under the care of Dr. d'A. The Trade Winds. The earth turns on its axis, from vest to east, and with it rotates daily the enormous envelope of the atmosphere. The velocity of rotation at the equator is something over 1,000 miles an hour; at thirty degrees distance it is about 150 miles an hour less, in higher latitudes it is still less; and at the poles nothing. Therefore whenever the air moves north and south on the surface of the earth, it will carry with it a greater or less velocity of rotation than the places it passes over, and will turn into an easterly or westerly wind according as it approaches or recedes from the equator. In the region of the sun's greatest heat, the air, rarified and ightened, is continually rising, and cooler currents come in on both sides to take the place of the ascending volume. As these side currents come from a distance of some degrees from the equator, they have, at starting, an eastern velocity many miles an hour less than the localities they will eventually reach. Consequently they will appear to lag behind in all the course of their progress to the equator-that is, they will have a westerly motion united with their north and south movements. These are the great trade winds, blowing constantly from the northeast on this side, and the southeast on the other side of the equator.—Popular Science Monthly.

Spacie Payments. A bill has been drafted to meet substantially, the recommendations of the President in his recent speci message with regard to the earl resumption of speciepsyments, an submitten to him, as it probab! will be to the Committee of Way and Means. Its provisions diffin several respects from the sug gestions of the President, but there i reason to believe that he will not se lously object to the changes. The bill provides for the use of thirty-yes L per cent. bonds, already authorized by the act of July, 1870, and by the redemption act of January, 1875 The amount of greenbacks to be fund ed into these bonds, is \$100,000,000 limited to \$10,000,000 in any one

month. A further sum, say of \$30, 000,000 of greenbacks, is authorized to be withdrawn in exchange for sub sidiary silver, and to this end the coir is to be increased to the aggregate of \$80,000,000, including the \$50,000, 000 at present authorized. The the ory of the provision is that silver change will take the place of the small greenback ones and twos. SCHOOL BOOKS.

A bill has been introduced in the State Senate to empower the State Board of Education to select a list of ext books, that shall be used in all of the primary and graded schools hroughout the State. In some repects this will be beneficial, and in others, detrimental to the school interests of the State. By this arrange ment there will be a regularity which cannot otherwise be gained, but on the other hand, there are objections that will more than offset this good. Where such a law has been enforced

In commenting upon the resolutions at the time they were published, the Tribune pointed out to the Green backers that they were making the serious mistake of insisting upon a necessarily contracted currency-the greenbacks - whie the President's plan would enlarge the currency by bringing into general circulation the coin now hoarded, and add to it there after the coin product of the country. which is no longer needed to pay the foreign differences against us, the differences being now in our favor. But Mr. Hoyt pretends not to be able to understand this simple and natur al effect of resumption, and attempts to justify his position in a communication which we print in another col umn this morning. There are only two points in his present statement of the case, viz: (1) His doubt of the success, of the redemption plan, and his suggestion that it be tried without any law on the subject; and (2) his confidence in the plan of making greenbacks receivable for all dues, public and private, and demand that it be tried with the aid of the law. This presentation of the case will strike the impartial reader as rather one-sided or selfish, as it all rests on Mr. Hoyt's individual conviction; but the points are otherwise obviously

But this was not the President's proposition. He conteulated the offer of a 4 per cent. go'd ond into which a certain proportion of the greenbacks might be funded a the option of the holders. This woulgive greenbacks an equal value with coin, but would not necessarily lead o their retirement unless currency were so superabundant as not to be able to earn more than 4 per cent. in commercial uses. The gold being more valuable than greenbacks, and its le gitimate exclusive use for report hav ing disappeared with the increase of exports over imports, it would come into the general circulating medium and increase the money supply of the country. Of course, any individual effort at substituting specie for green backs while the latter are at a dis count of 5 per cent. would not be fair test as to the effect of resump tion in equalizing the value of specie and greenbacks, and bringing the ormer into circulation alongshie of he latter.

'2. Mr. Hoyt's plan for this equali zation in greenbacks and coin is to make the former receivable for all lues, public and private. There are now two exceptions to this rule; the greenbacks are not receivable by the Government for customs, and not payable by the Government the for interest on the public debt. Greenbacks are now legal tender for all private debts, for United States, State, county, city, town and school taxes, for everything except duties on imports. The annual volume of the agricultural business of the country, we will say, is represented by four thousand millions, that of the manufacturing business by the same amount, and that of the general and speculative trade by as much more. Then there are twelve thousand millions of transactions in which greenbacks are lawful tender. The duties on imports amount to only \$125,000, 000 yearly, so that the single transaction in which greenbacks are not a legal tender is only 1 per cent. of those in which they are a legal-tender. Does Mr. Hoyt expect that their increased use by I per cent. will wipe out a depreciation of 5 per cent. or would have wiped out a depreciation of 25 per cent. when they were that much below par? But the fact is that even this single exclusion of duties on imports does not affect the general public, since the goods are sold for greenbacks all the same, and the im porter must provide the gold in his own way to pay the duties. Now, suppose greenbacks were receivable the Government would have to go into Wall street twice a year to buy gold to meet the semi annual interest

on the public debt. In other words. the Government would then have to do what the importers do for it under the present system. But could the Government do it to so good an ad vantage? The importers are large capitalist and business men; they are constantly using their capital and opportunites to get greenbacks as nearly the value of gold as possible. since it is their interest to have g ld and greenbacks approximate. They are always "bulling" greenbacks and bearing" gold. If duties were payable in greenbacks, however, their incentive to do this would disappear, and the Government would be felt at the mercy of the gold brokers, the Wall street speculators, and the incompetent and knavish who would see a chance for money making in the semi-annual purchase of gold to pay the interest on the public debt. and that is for them to say that the bonds, interest and principal, must also be paid in greenbacks. A good many of them will hesitate to take this position, because it is no more nor less than repudiation. The United States cannot force the foreign hold ers of the Government bonds to take greenbacks in payment of interest a d principal, when they acquired them under the pledge that they would be paid in coin. This cannot be done lawfully, and to undertake to do it by war would be a disastrous failure. The greenbacks in this country are of no more value in other countries than the depreciated shiuplasters of Aus tria, Russia, Italy, Turkey, or the South American States are in this country. The products of other countries which we have to buy can not be secured by payment in green backs any more than foreigners could purchase our wheat, corn, tobacco. cotton, gold, and silver products with the shinplasters i-sued by foreign countries. If the Government can not pay its interest in greenbacks, it will only depreciate the greenback by making it receivable for duties and forcing the Government into the market as a purchaser of gold. If we cannot buy the foreign products which we need with greenbacks, it is useless

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





A CHEAP PLUM PUDDING.—Soak ome dried apples all night, in the morning chop them very fine. Put a sescupful of them into a pint of molasses and put them upon the back of the stove, where they will keep slighty warm for an hour or two. After that add to them one cup chopped suct, one cup of water, one cup of chopped raisins, a pinch of salt, a esspoonful of cinnamon, three half pints of flour, and two teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Put the flour in last and stir all together thoroughly. Boil two and a half hours in a bowl or tin, pudding mold. This may be eten with wine sauce, and is a very good imitation of a genuine plum pudding.



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


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
