

SHERMAN'S OPINION

A special to the Chicago Tribune gives the following as the views of Secretary Sherman," concerning the much vexed silver question, as given the reporter by the Secretary himself:

"The current value of the genuine bi-metalic standard of value is assumed by the gold-monometalist to be impossible in the face of the fact that gold cannot be divided so as to meet one of the hundred daily wants of life: Now both these extreme opinions are just as certain to be abandoned, after full discussion, as time passes. It is an old dispute that has periodically risen for more than two thousand years, and has always been adjusted by the Government issuing both metals as coin, and maintaining their equal value at a fixed rate by limiting the amount. The metal less valuable in the market than its legal ratio must be limited in its issue, barring the absolute need of it to fix the amount. In our country where we are struggling to make our paper money equal to coin, we are happily in a condition to do this easily and with profit to the Government. The way is to issue silver coin whenever demanded, the old silver dollar as well as the smaller coins in exchange for paper money, either for fractional currency or United States notes, and retire them. The silver coins already have superseded the body of the fractional currency, and they are a legal-tender to the same extent as fractional currency. Let the Government buy the silver bullion at what it is worth, and coin silver dollars and issue them freely to everybody who will surrender a paper dollar. This is a fair and voluntary exchange that robs nobody. The silver dollar ought to be received by the Government and be made a legaltender precisely as the paper dollar now is. In this way perhaps fifty millions of silver dollars will supersede fifty millions of paper dollars; some say more, some say less; but let that be determined by the popular demand: This process. every step of it, will bring both paper and silver nearer and nearer to the

On the Road to Callfornia.

GRAND ISLAND, NEB., May 31. We left Omaha yesterday afternoon about five o'clock. It is a town of about 25,000 inhabitants, situated on the west side of the Missouri river. I do not like Omaha. It is a very dirty looking place, although they have some very nice looking buildings and some very large, fine looking hotels. The streets look very rough, and after a rain the mud is nearly knee deep; but as soon as the sun comes

out they dry off quickly, and that makes them look rough. Besides, they have no good sidewalks as we

have in Buchanan, but they are full. of bad places and sadly in need of repair. The bridge which seperates Omaha from Council Bluffs is about one mile long. The water in the river is very muddy.

We are now 154 miles in Nebraska. in a nice little town of 2,500 inhabitants. The country all around us is level as far as we can see, and is the best of farming land. We travel slowat about the rate of twelve miles an hour-so we can see all that is to be seen along the road. We have had splendid weather for traveling so far, neither too warm or too cold, but just There was a number of car loads right. We are having a fine time and enjoying ourselves.

June 1st .- We have just finished our breakfast and made up our bed, and while the cars stopped here for half an hour we went out to see the town of Sydney, a beautiful little place of 1,200 inhabitants. It is situated on the north branch of Platt river, 400 miles from Omaha and 987 miles from Buchanan. At Platt river we cross another muddy stream about three-fourths of a mile wide. The water in the river is not navigable, the average depth being about six inches. To look at it you would think it to be a very deep river, but it is like a great many people who make a great spread-there is not much of them after all.

We see a great many emigrant wagons; some going to California, others to the Black Hills, while others are returning home.

We have the privilege of building a fire whenever we wish, but we purchased a pocket cook stove in Chicago and often use that. I must tell you a little incident that occurred the first time we used it. We started up our little stove, and placed it on the car stove. In a short time an old lady smelled the coffee, filled her coffee pot with water, and put it on the car stove beside ours, then took her seat. Pretty soon she came back to see how it was progressing; found ours steaming away, and of course hers was as cold as ever. She appeared to be greatly astonished, for she evidently had never seen or heard of one before. From Oceana County.

000,000. HART, MICH:, June 11, 1877. As it is some time since I reported to the RECORD, many are the changes that have occurred in that time, and as the great majority of passing events would not interest the good people of Berrien County, we will confine ourselves to items of general interest to all.

The prospects of farmers are pretty good now. We have had quite a dry time for the last month, but recent rains have revived vegetation, and crops are looking well. Wheat bids fair for a bountiful harvest. Corn,

in some parts of the county, has been bothered some with the cut worm, but in most places it looks well, and farmers are cultivating it. The price of potatoes this season has stimulated farmers to plant an extra amount; and the prospect is that if the demand is good, a large amount will be shipped from here another fall and spring. shipped from Mears and Shelby in April and May, at prices ranging

from 70 to 95 cents per bushel. Oats and barley will be short on account of dry weather last month and up to the 7th inst. The fruit prospect is good. All the orchards on the Lake Shore that are old enough are full of fruit, and the prospect for small fruit was never more flattering than it is now. NEW ORLEANS, June 11. - The Galveston News' Laredo special says Gen. Escobedo and Col. Sain, of his staff, arrived here vesterday. 



The best fertilizer for potatoes, so says a good practical farmer, is pre-pared after the following formula: Mix thoroughly, one bushel of salt, two bushels plaster of Paris, four bushels air slacked lime, and eight bushels of good wood ashes; add to this as much, in bulk, of clean sand or loam, and put a large handful in each hill: This quantity is sufficient for an acre. It is cheap, and easy to procure and apply; and the quantity of the potatoes and abundant vield will satisfy any one who tries it. Besides, the articles are all good, and much needed by most of our soils .---Vermont Farmer.

"HARD TIMES" COFFEE. - Boil two good sized potatoes and mix them with flour as you would lard for pie-crust, and put in enough water to make it roll out about the thickness of pie crust. Then put it in the oven and dry it (not bake, but dry it.) Take it out and cut it in chunks about the size of a grain of coffee. Take as much coffee as you have of the preparation and brown the coffee a little before putting in the preparation; then put it in and let it brown with the coffee. It absorbs the aroma of the coffee, and one cannot detect any difference between this and pure coffee, while it is a saving of onehalf. It also serves to settle the coffee:

It is not generally known that the August supply of rhubarb is the best for all preserving purposes, as, growing during the heat of the summer. it requires less sugar than the spring supply. But, should the summer be a dry one, the stalks are apt to become rather hollow and stringy; care should therefore be taken to select medium-sized stalks, brittle and full of juice.__Rhubarb preserved is very nice.- Western Rural.

DUTCH LOAF.-One pound of flour, half a pound of sugar, one egg, quarter of a pound of butter, half a pound of raisins, and half a pound of currants-well cleaned and rolled in flour; a half teaspoonful of baking soda dissolved in enough buttermilk to make the batter of the proper consistency. Beat the butter and sugar to a cream, add the eggs, then stir in the flour and buttermilk; and the fruit last. Bake slowly, as the fruit will not admit of a hot oven. Do not forget to add a pinch of salt to the mixture.

To separate honey from wax, put honey-comb and all into a tin pan upon a moderately warm stove, adding a tablespoonful of water to each pound of honey. Stir occasionally with a piece of wire until the contents of the pan are in a liquid condition. Do not allow boiling to begin. Remove the pan from the fire and set it aside to cool: The cake of wax, to which all impurities will adhere, may then be carefully lifted off with a knife.

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
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


