nesday, the 27th of last month. Twelve hundred delegates were present, representing every county in the State Hon. James Wilson, of Lama county, was elected permanent President. In taking the chair he counseled harmony and adherence to the old time principles of the party.

The convention proceeded at once to ballot for Governor, and Hon. John Gear was nominated on the first ballot by the following vote: Gear, 507; Sherman, 342; Newbold, 105; scattering, 3.

Frank L. Campbell was nominated on the second ballot for Lieutenant Governor; Chief Justice Day, the present incumbent, for Supreme Judge; and Prof. Van Coellen for Superintendent of public instruction.

The first, second and third resolutions adopted, the first affirming the United States to be a nation, not a league; the second, that the work of the Republican party to continue to preserve to the people the great truths contained in the declaration of independence is not yet ended; and the third, declaring it to be the policy of the party to establish the permanent pacification of the southern States, are substantially the same as those contained in the national platform. The others read as follows : 4. The public credit should be sacredly maintained, and all the obligations of the Government honestly discharged, and that we favor the early attainment of a currency convertible into coin, and therefore advocate the gradual resumption of specie payments by continuous and speedy steps in that direction.

5. That the silver dollar having been the legal unit of value from the foundation of the Federal government until 1875, the law under which its coinage was suspended should be repealed at the earliest possible day, and silver made with gold a legal tender for the payment of all debts both public and private, and also believe that the present volume of currency should be maintained until the wants of trade and commerce demands its further contraction.

6. That the investment of capital in this State should be encouraged by wise and liberal - legislation, but we condemn the policy of granting subsidies at the public expense to either individuals or corporations for their private use.

7. That we demand the most rigid economy in all the departments of the Government, and that taxation be limited to the actual wants of public expenditure.





# How to Cut Hay.

At this season of the year the papers generally get up a discussion as to when to cut grass. To us it seems nuch like the old discussion as to when to prune trees, which Dr. Warler, a popular and intelligent writer, a few years ago settled, by declaring that in his experience he had found the best time to be whenever there was a branch which needed cutting, and a sharp knife at hand ready to take it off. The discussion on the hay question usually takes the form of an inquiry as to the relative unrtitiveness of hay that was cut just before the flowering, or just after; and most of the evidence on either side is drawn from chemical changes going on at that time which ought, according to chemical theories, to make it more nutritious at one time than an-







Washing.

For ordinary washings use a tablespoonful of borax to every five gallons of water, and two ounces of soap; soak the clothes in this over night; give them a thorough boiling without wringing. When the clothes are very much soiled see that the wa-ter is made soft with borax. Clothes thus washed will not turn yellow. In washing flannels, use one tablespoonful of borax to five gallons of water, without soap. It will not shrink them. For starching linen, use one tablespoonful of borax to one pint of hoiling starch. For washing and bleaching laces, put one tablespoonful of borax to one pint of boiling water; leave the articles to soak in the solution for 24 hours, then wash with a little soap. For cleaning black cashmeres, wash in hot suds with a little borax; rinse in blueing water-very blue, and iron on the wrong side while damp.-Cincinnati Gazette.

The Housewife's Table.

The following is a very valuable housewife's table, by which persons not having scales and weights at "hand may readily measure the article wanted to form any recipe without the trouble of weighing, allowance to be made for any extraordinary dryness or moisture of the article weighed or measured: Wheat flour, 1 pound is 1 quart. Indian meal, 1 pound 2 ounces are 1 quart. Butter, when soft, 1 pound is 1 quart. Loaf sugar, broken, 1 pound is 1 quart. White sugar; powdered, 1 pound 2 ounces are 1 quart. Ten eggs are 1 pound. A common tumbler holds half a pint. A teacup is 1 gill.

After a few applications the scales will disappear, the hair becomes soft and brilliant, and young hair will be seen to start out.
