Kansas Corresponence.

HUMBOLDT, Nov. 28, 1877.

EDITOR RECORD, Dear Sir:—
Thinking, perhaps, a few lines from a Michigander might be of some interest to you and the readers of your paper, I venture to address a few lines to you as to what I have seen and think of South Kansas.

In the first place I would say if

In the first place I would say if settlers expect to find pigs running ready roasted, or milk and honey running from every river or stream, they will be disappointed. But still, I think if they are a "good shot" they can have plenty of prairie chickens for meat, and as for fruit or grain, I think Kansas will compare with any

think Kansas will compare with any State in the Union.

I entered the State at Kansas City. (which, by the way, is the Chicago of the West) made the first stop at Humboldt on my way to South Kansas. Found the place a bright, growing town of 1,200 inhabitants. Found two old Michigan boys (Dye Bros.) engaged in a wholesale and retail grocery business, the best firm in South Kansas, with a branch store in Independence, Montgomery county, and as I have traveled about in several counties in the State. I hear the Dye as I have traveled about in several counties in the State, I hear the Dye Bros. spoken of in the highest terms. Through the courtesy of G. W. Hutcherson, land agent for the L. L. & G. R. R., we took a drive of some twenty-five miles to view railroad lands. We found section after section of fine prairie, land, belonging to the

lands. We found section after section of fine prairie land belonging to the Company, held at \$4.00 per acre on time or \$3.20 cash. Returning to Humboldt, took the train south to Thayer, went west six miles over the prairie to Mr. Valentine's, formerly of Niles township, Mich. Found him happy and contented. Staid with him over night. And there also met Henry Curtis, formerly of Buchanan, not making carpet stretchers, but digging in Kansas dirt. Went over next day to see Dr. T. F. C. Dodd, formerly an old druggist of Buchanan, Mich., an old druggist of Buchanan, Mich., ty, on a quarter section of land, and between pills and prairie dirt he is getting along nicely. Spent the Sabbath with him; found the doctor superintending a Sunday School; heard good sermon from a Congregational minister. Altoona is situated on Virdigris river, fourteen miles west of Thayer, on the L. L. & G. R. R. The river makes an excellent water power. There is also a three foot gauge railroad graded through the place from Theyer to Fredonia, and they are expecting to hear the whistle soon. The doctor thinks the place will be "some" in the near future. Returning to Thayer we took the train for Independence, which is one of the liveliest

cities of its size I ever visited; of 4,000 inhabitants and only seven years old (sixteen miles north of Indian Territory), in Montgomery county, Kansas. I think Montgomery county the best county of land I have seen in the State. There is a variety of soil,-some rocky and poor, but affording good building material and timber along the streams, and an abundance of coal worth from eight to ten cents per bushel at the mine. The county is also well watered, and a better fruit county cannot be found. Peaches, grapes, apricots, persimons, and many apple trees are large enough to bear. Some are going into fruit quite extensively, as there is a good market both north and west for fruit. There is no railroad nor governmentland in this county. Land is worth from \$5 to \$75 per acre, according to

the locality and improvements. I expect soon to make Montgomery county my home. I have purchased 160 acres south-west of Independence five miles, and would say to all my friends thinking of coming to Kansas, come and see for yourselves. I know of no better opening for small means and willing hands. I have met persons every day, since coming to the State, from almost every State north

and east in the Union. As to the climate they have about two months of what they call winter, -of course, no sleighing. Farmers tell me they commence plowing, the first of February and sow oats the last of the month; plant corn the last of March or the middle of April. Winter wheat is grown quite extensively, and they think, the best quality. Wheat is now worth 90 cents, corn 20 cents, hogs \$3,75 per hundred, potatoes 40 cents, oats 18 cents.



Secretary Sherman of the United States Treasury Department, in his annual report for the year ending June 30, advises the Government to provide for a series of postal savings banks, for the receipt of deposits which may be convertable into U.S. 4 per cent. bonds, and that the money so received shall be used in the payment of bonds bearing a higher rate of interest, and by this means retain a greater portion of the public debt among our people instead of in forleign countries.

During the discussion in the Senate on Thursday last, of the House silver bill, Senator Stanley Matthews submitted the following concurrent resolution in regard to the payment of bonds in silver, and at his request it was ordered that it lie on the table and be printed:

WHEREAS, By an act entitled "An act to strengthen the public credit," approved March 18, 1869, it was pro vided and declared that the faith of the United States was thereby solemnly pledged to the payment in coin, or lits equivalent, of all interest bearing obligations of the United States, except in cases where the law authorizing the issue of such obligations had expressly provided that the same might be paid in lawful money; or other currency than gold and silver;

WHEREAS, All bonds of the United States authorized to be issued by the act entitled. "An act to authorize the refunding of the national debt," approved July 14, 1870, by the terms of said act were declared to be redeemable in coin of the then present standard value, bearing interest, payable semi-annually, in such coin; and WHEREAS, All bonds of the United

States, authorized to be issued under the act entitled "An act to provide for the resumption of specie payments," approved Jan. 14, 1875, are required to be descriptive of bonds of the United States described in said act of Congress approved July 14, 1870, entitled "An act to authorize the refunding of the national debt;"

WHEREAS, At the date of the passage of said act of Congress last afored, to-wit, the 14th day of July. 1870, the coin of the United States standard value of that date incluled silver dollars of the weight of 1121 grains each, as declared by the not approved July 18, 1837, entitled An act supplementary to the act entitled 'An act establishing a mint and regulating coins of the United States' to be a legal tender of payment, according to their nominal value, for any sums whatever;" therefore,
Resolved, by the Senate, the House

of Representatives concurring therein, that all bonds of the United States assued, or authorized to be issued, under said acts of Congress herein before recited, are payable, principal and interest, at the option of the government of the United States, in sil ver dollars of the coinage of the Uni-Led States containing 4121 grains each of standard silver; and that to estore to its coinage such silver coins is legal tender in payment of said ponds, principal and interest, is not in violation of public faith, nor in dero-gation of the rights of public creditors.

Apples are beginning to bear some. They can be had here at \$1 per bushel. Wheat is from 80 cents to \$1 per bushel; potatoes 50 cents; corn 20 cents; hogs alive \$3.50

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


