Healthial Beds.

Germany excels any country with which I am familiar in the cleanliness of its beds. It seems as much a part of yearly house-cleaning with them to have the hair removed from the mattress, to have it well beaten and sunned, and the cover washed, as it is with us to have the carpets whipped and freed from their disease begetting dust. I grant that it would be a difficult and expensive undertaking for an American house keeper, for skilled laborers are rare, and when found must be well paid as they should be. Knowing the obstacle, then, in the way of thorough renovation of our beds, we should take all the more care to protect and air them. Every bed should have especially made for it, the size of a tick, a white, tacked comforter, not too thick so as to be unmanageable in washing; over this the sheet is spread. Every bed that is daily used should be subjected to the purifying rays of the sun at least once a week, and should be leit open for the reception of air and light some time before being made up. Beds not frequently used are often found very musty and dissagreeable to the guests, The parlor beds that swallow their own contents by a magic touch, are fair without, but in time, for the lack of proper airing, they become foul within.

Ham for Saudwiches.

A writer gives the following to the Country Gentleman: Boil as for the table; take one third fat, two thirdlean, chop fine, add a small teaspoon ful each of pepper sauce and Wor cestershire or Halford sauce, mustard and cayenne peper; mix thoroughly and keep in a lightly covered bowl. To make sandwiches, cut white bread in smooth slices, in uniform slices, in uniform thickness, spread thinly with butter, then spread with the prepared ham thickly or thinly to suit the taste; cut the slices across, and place the halves together with ham between. In adding the cayenne peper, put in a little at a time, and taste, adding to suit yourself. I make a pint bowlful at a time. It is very handy for small parties, levees, basket pic-nics,

Potatoes and Potato Eyes.

A French agricultural journal gives the result of experiments by scientif ic men in the cultivation of potatoes the chief conclusions of which are, that the vigor of the potato plant is always in direct proportion to the weight of the tuber used for sets, and that theret is great variety in the productive power, not only of different tubers, but also of different "eyes," in the same potato.

To the first proposition practical men will not particularly object. It is well known that the planting of whole potatoes insures a stronger growth of vine than those from single eyes, for instance, where no special pains is taken to supply the young plant with special manure to force the young growth; nevertheless, there is no well authenticated account record-ed that crops from single eyes have resulted in the degeneration of the potato, any more than there is a re-cord that propagating other plants from single eyes causes a failure to reproduce plants perfect in every re-

While in Northern Iowa, recently, a case came to our notice of a new use for straw, which if applied here may be of vast service to wheat growers. An intelligent farmer there tried the experiment of spreading a light covering of it on his wheat land after the grain was sown, thinking that the growing stalk would readily find its way through, and that during the drouth of July and August, which almost always occurs, it would act as mulch and be beneficial to his crop. In this he was not mistaken, for the average on that ten acres was forty bushels to the acre, while on the same land adjoining, with the same seed sown and as carefully put in, the yield was but twenty two bushels to the acre. The increase was thus nearly double, while the straw was in excellent condition to turn under this fall, and a double benefit consequentis in a second a double benefit consequently secured. The only objection we see to the plan is, that the wind of spring might blow the straw into heaps and otherwise disarrange it, but this might be remedied by applying it after the wheat had come up. A temporary check would doubtless be given to the stalk, but it would be given to the stalk, but it would soon come through and grow the more vigorously afterward.—Pioneer-

DIAMOND CEMENT.—Soak isinglass in water till it is soft, then dissolve in the smallest possible quantity of proof spirit by the aid of a gentle heat. In two ounces of the mixture dissolve ten grains of ammonium, and while still liquid add half a drachm of mastic dissolved in three drachms of rectified spirits, stir well together and bottle. For use the bottle is placed in warm water; and as soon as the contents liquefy use immediately.

JAPAN VARNISHES FOR IRON.—Mix shellac varnish with a sufficient quantivy of ivory black or lamp black. 2. Asphaltum 1 lb., melt, then add hot balsam of copaiva and thin with turpentine. 3. Grind lamp black very smooth and add copal varnish to the proper consistence. 4. Asphaltum 3 ozs.; boiled oil, 4 quarts; burnt umber, 8 ozs.; mix by heat and when cooling thin with turpentine. 5. Amber, 12 ozs.; asphaltum, 2 ozs.; fuse by heat and add boiled oil & pint, resin, 2 ozs. when cooling add 1 pint of turpentine.

Foster and his wife reached the hut in the evening. They were almost crazed by the eight of their maltreat ed offspring and despoiled home. The children were unbound and given stimulants to restore them. Foster ran to every house close by, and soon a crowd of sympathizing neighbors gathered at the shanty. Physicians soon came. In one hour bands of citizens were organized for pursuit of the outlaws, the police were informed of the occurrence and both city and country were scoured for miles. Yesterday morning the chase was renewed. All haunts in the county frequented by tramps were visited during the day, but to no purpose. Several suspicious looking persons were taken into cus-






