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The last Legislature of this State passed an amendment to Section 76. of chapter 12 of the compiled laws. which, among other things, says: "No person shall be eligible to the office of township treasurer for more than two years in succession." This has raised a question in the minds of some as to the eligibility of those who have held the office for two years or more, and an Allegan man has laid the matter before the Attorney General, who, under date of Jan. 16, replies as follows:

The Honolulu papers announce the death of William P. Ragsdale, Governor of the leper settlement on the island of Molokai. Ragsdale was a Hawaiian by birth, and was at one time a prominent lawyer and the most noted orator of the kingdom. Wheat Griddle Cakes

In using sour milk for griddle cakes care should be taken to have the milk just "loppered ;" if it is too old, the cakes will be sticky in spite of all you can do; if not sour enough, the the taste of the soda will be perceptible before sufficient can be put in to make the batter light. This can be remedied by using a small quantity of cream of tartar, or instead enough vinegar to counteract the effect of alkali; it is better, however, to have the milk just nicely "clabbered." Into a quart of this stir the same quantity of sifted flour and a teaspoonful of corn meal; add salt to taste, and mix all into a smooth batter. Put in a tablespoonful of melted butter; add two teaspoonfuls soda dissolved in a little hot water. The mixture must be beaten until it is perfectly smooth and light, then dropped in spoonfuls on a hot griddle, baked to a beautiful golden brown, and served immediate ly. Two eggs added to the above will make them still nicer ; the whites should be beaten separately and stir in the last thing. Buttermilk can be used in place of sour milk, in which case a little more shortening will be needed to make the cakes tender, and care must bo taken not to put in too much soda. To use sweet. milk mix the batter in the same proportions, but instead of soda sift one teaspoonful of baking powder with each cup of fleur used, and add two eggs for every quart of milk.-Prai-

Low Roosts for hens.

rie Farmer.

Roosts are an important consideration in a house for hens; and their importance goes further than the fact that they furnish means for the fowls to pass the night in the way nature teaches them. Most farmers, and and many others, follow out the old idea that fowls must "roost high" to be out of danger from foxes and other enemies, build their roosts at the highest point in the hen-house, so high that in many cases a ladder has to be provided for the fowls to mount to their roosting places. Fowl fanciers and thoughtful hen-raisers put their hen roosts only a few feet from the ground, in some instances only two feet above it, and all at the some height. Fat hens and most full of eggs are frequently injured by jumping from high roosts, and more valuable fowls have the been spoiled. Henhouses should be made secure against depredatory animals, so that the roosts need not be placed out of reach. The roosts should always be placed at the same height, because hens will all want to roosts on the highest one, and if there is not room for them, some are sure to be crowded off and fall to the floor, where they will stay if it is too dark to make a

A good way to keep butter cool without ice, is to set the dish containing it into an extra large flower-pot saucer containing water, - or any other similar dish will do. Then invert over it a large porous earthen flower pot, that has never been used for plants, letting the rim rest in the water, and corking up the hole in the bottom. Set in as cool a place as convenient, in a current of air if possible, and dash water occasionally over the outside of the pot. The evaporation of the water will keep the butter cool and firm. This is substantially the plan adopted in India and other warm climates.

The farmer who has more live stock than he has hay and grain to keep in good order should make up his mind to do one of the two things. He should sell at once some of his poorest animals or else be content to buy hay and meal with which to feed them when his own haymows and grain bins are empty. For ourselves we prefer the former course. Many farmers think differently, and would rather pay high prices for hay and grain than to keep only what cattle their farms will naturally sustain. If all farmers would follow either one of these examples their interests would be advanced much more rapidly than they are at present.—N. E. Homestead.
