The trial of Rande, the desparado who was arrested in St. Louis a few months since, is now in progress, with a fair prospect of a chance to test the strength of a hempen cord.

Pope Pius IX died at the Vatican in Rome, Feb. 7th, in the eighty fifth year of his age. He is the one of the sovereigns who bore sway over more civilized countries of the world, than any other.

The Treasurer of Kansas has purchased \$168,000 of the new 4 per cent. bonds on account of that State. \$300,-000 have been sold for the investment of the Kansas school fund.

The Treasury Department have liscovered that a package containing \$1,830.50, belonging to the Government, has mysteriously disappeared and the committee of investigation is now hard at work to find it. The last trace of the package is in the hands of Ex-Secretary New. The affair is creating some excitement at the Capitol.

During the year 1877, the aggregate amount of insurance risks written in this State footed \$145, \$43, 952.92, and the gross premiums received during the same time were \$1,883,832.58 total losses incurred by fire, \$1,342, 588.55, leaving a balance of \$541, 244.03 above losses incurred as the profits of the insurance companies.

The Ohio Legislature is trying to make a protective tariff of their own, by passing a law to charge a license of \$50 to all traveling men representing business houses in other States. This is probably intended to drive foreign tradesmen from the State, and secure the trade of the State to her own dealers. It may be all very well for the dealers, but perhaps not for the consumer who will thus be made prey to the monoply.

Senator Christency has introduced a petition from this State, asking for the passage of a law granting female suffrage. In commenting on the petition, he said that when he should become satisfied a majority of the people of the country were in favor of female suffrage he would vote for it, but until then he would not. He did not think these petitions should be presented to Congress; the Legislatures of the States were the proper bodies to present them to.

first Monday of April, the following Amendments to the Constitution of this State are to be submitted to the People of the State, for their adoption or rejection, viz: An Amendment to Section 12 of Article 6, relative to the appointment of Clerk of the Supreme Court, as provided by Joint Resolution No. 30, Laws of 1877. Said Section now reads as follows:

"SECTION 12. The Clerk of each County organized for judicial purposes, shall be the Clerk of the Circuit Court of such County, and of the Supreme Court when held within the same.".

If the proposed Amendment be adopted, said Section will read as follows:

"SECTION 12. The Justices of the Supreme Court shall appoint the Clerk of said Court, and the Clerk of each County organized for judicial purposes, shall be Clerk of the Circuit Court for such County."

Also an Amendment to Section 7 of Article 15, relative to corporations, as provided by Joint Resolution No. 33, Laws of 1877. Said Section now reads as follows:

"SECTION 7. The stockholders of all corporations and joint stock associations, shall be individually liable for all labor performed for such corporstion or association.'

If the proposed Amendment be adopted, said Section will read as follows:

"SECTION 7. The stockholders in all corporations and joint stock associations shall be individually liable in an amount equal to the par value of their respective shares which they own to have owned in such corporations or associatoons for all labor done in behalf os such corporation or joint stock association at the time of their being such stockholders."

The definite appointment of J. J. Woodman, ex-speaker of the Michigan House of representatives, as commissioner to the Paris exposition, is authoritatively announced from Washington. This is a first-rate selection. President Hayes denies that he has appointed a cadet to please Gordon of Georgia, and it is said that he will appoint no more Democrats to office where respectable Republicans can be found. He is also indignant at the bad faith of the Louisiana confederates, as shown in their prosecution of the returning board before a packed court and jury, while scores of ballotbox stuffers, shot-gun canvassers, and open murderers of Republicans, walk about unmolested, and some of them hold fat offices from the Democracy. -Lansing Republican.

### Improved Curculio Tran.

Mr. M. B. Batheham, of Ohio, in an address on plum culture, gives the following as an improved form of the curculio catcher originally invented by the late Dr. Hull, of Illinois. He 88.YS :

The form of curculio catcher most improved is, I think' a Michigan invention somewhat improved. It is a light frame work in the shape of a wide hopper, covered with oil-cloth, and mounted on two light wheels, like a hand-cart. It has an opening on one side to admit the body of the tree, and a tin box or drawer at the bottom to receive and hold the beetles till it. is convenient to cremate them. The jarring is done by means of an implement resembling a stout crutch, six feet in length, which is carried on top of the catcher, and is operated by the man who works the machine-this being found more economical than to have a second hand for the purpose. One man, after a little practice, can operate on 350 trees in an hour. The process has to be commenced so soon as the blossoms begin to fade, and performed every day or twice a day when the insects are numerous, for three or four weeks. But the cost of labor is small compared with the value of the crop, when there are several thousand trees in bearing, so as to make it an object to give them regular attention.

## Boll Meat Slowly.

Boiled meat is a great deal better if it is not boiled too fast. Fast boiling toughens the fiber, expels the the juice of the meat, and makes of the tenderest sirloin or round a tasteless, chippy indigestible dish. The best way is to let it boil violently for say three minutes at first, and then keep it just barely short of boiling heat until it is done. The fast boiling will toughen the outside and keep it in the juices, and the slow simmering afterward will render the inside tender and delicious. If a part or the whole is to be served cold, let it cool in the liquor. The same rule applies to all kinds of meat, fish and fowl.

An intelligent farmer tried the ex-

periment of spreading a light covering of straw on his wheat land after the grain was sown, thinking that the grownig stalk would readily find its way through, and that during the drouth of July and August, which almost always occurs, it would act as a mulch and be beneficial to his crop. In this he was not mistaken, for the average on that ten acres was 40 bushels to the acre, while on the same kind of land adjoining, with the same seed sown and as carefully put in, the yield was but 22 bushels to the acre. The increase was thus nearly double, while the straw was in excellent condition to turn under this fall, and a double benefit consequently secured. -Pioneer Press.

## An Independent Class.

There is no business panning out better these hard times than farming. There is one good thing about farming-a man can always raise enough to eat, if he is any account. He can raise his potatoes, cabbages, onions, turnips, beets, etc. He can grow the strawberries, gooseberries, rasp-berries, grapes, apples, and other fruits to satisfy the wants of his family. He can have poultry and eggs the year round. He can produce his own pork and bacon and lard to last a year. He can have veal and mutton and beef. The people in the city, if they have these articles, must warn the money and save it to buy them. This is a big item in favor of the farmer .- Colman's Rural World.
