

General Butler made his speech on the currency question, in the House Tuesday. He is a strong advocate of the 3.65 per cent. interconvertible bond scheme. with an unlimited currency never to be redeemed. He wants a dollar to be made of such material. as will be of the least intrinsic value and it shall never be exported or desirable to carry out of the country, framing an American system of finance. He does not propose to adapt it to the wants of any other nation, and especially the Chinese, who are nearly one-quarter of the world. He proposes to have the American system of finances to govern the world, instead of the American people attempting to conform with the usage of the world as hertofore. Another great blessing he asks for this country, that her bonds shall be returned to her at once from other countries now holding them at 50 cents on the dollar, in exchange for our merchandise.



plenty of milk in winter, you must give the cows plenty of good feed. You might as well expect to make shoes without leather, as to get milk from cows unless they are fed something to make the milk. A gristmill will not turn out flour unless it is fed wheat, neither the cow turn out milk unless fed such food as will make it. She needs meal, bran, etc., made into slop; good hay, turnips, carrots, etc., and a clean, dry bed, in a warm shed. Milk is a bountiful diet, and is indispensible, almost, for childern. Many farmers are very negligent

root of the plant known as dragon root, Jack-in-the-pulpit, or Indian turnip, either green or dry; grate about onehalf a teaspoonful into four tiaspoonfuls of sweet milk; simmer gently a few minutes, then thicken with bread crumbs, and apply hot as possible. This can be heated two or three times, adding a little milk each time. If the felon is just starting this will take it back ; if somewhat advanced, will draw it out quickly and gently. It is well to put a little tallow on the poultice, especially after opening, to prevent sticking. This same poultice is good for a carbuncle or any other rising.

COUGH SYRUP .-- Put five cents' worth of pine pitch into a pint of water. Let it simmer until the water is well impregnated with the flavor. Dip out the gum which remains un-dissolved and add honey enough to aweeten, and make a thick syrup. Strain this and bottle. Dose, a teaspoonful four or five times a day, acco.ding to the severity of the cough. It will afford speedy relief.—Prairie Farmer.

CRACKER PIES. - (Lemon)-Four milk crackers, crushed fine; one cup sugar, one teaspoonful tartaric acid, one teaspoonful extract lemon, one teaspoonful butter, one cup boiling water, poured on after mixing; yolks of three eggs, enough of the whites for frosting in place of top crust.

CAROLINA PIES .--- Yolks of three eggs, three tablespoonfuls sugar; milk to fill the plate; flavor to taste. Beat the eggs and sugar, together and then pour in the milk. After it is baked beat one teaspoonful of sugar into the whites of the eggs and put on top for a frosting, and set into the oven to brown.


