What do all these things mean? Great strikes are now in progress at Fall River, and in the coal region of Illinois, and a greater is anticipated in the coal region of Pennsylvania. If there were no central guidance and deliberate plan it would be quite likely that strikes would lead to outbreaks, and these to sympathetic riots all over the country, as happened last sum-

season: The only really disagreeable portion of the year is during the three summer months, viz. : December, January and February, when the sun attains great power and hot winds from the distant interior, greatly increase the natural heat of the season. The leading agricultural product of South Australia is wheat, which, owing to its peculiar dryness and thin shell, commands the highest prices paid in England. The product in 1876 was 10,739,834 bushels. Considerable attention is given to grapes, there being about 5,000 acres of vine-

yards. South Australia has about 317 miles of railway and over 3,000 miles of telegraph, including the overland line from Adelaide on the south, to Port Darwin on the north coast, built through a hitherto unexplored wilderness for 1,973 miles and forming connection with the sub-marine cable to India, and thence via. Suez to England.

Adelaide, the capital and principal commercial city of South Australia, is situated in latitude 34 degrees south, on the river Towens, six miles east of Gulf St. Vincent, Port Adelaide being the shipping port. The city is divided into two portions, North and South

Adelaide, by the river which is crossed by two massive iron bridges and two constructed of wood-the new iron bridge has a span of 108 feet and a width of 54 feet. The public buildings are numerous,

comprising the government house, the town hall, which has a fine organ, a lofty tower and peal of eight bells. The new post-office is a very fine structure of white freestone, also towered. The government offices, a fine row of stone buildings; the houses of legislature, the South Australian Institute, with museum and library of about 20,000 volumns; hospital, city baths, markets, theatres, and an unusual large number of churches, of which St. Paul's Cathedral, when finished, will be the most important. There are nine public squares or parks, besides the Botanic gardens, that occupy an area of 124 acres. Adelaide has two morning and two evening dailies, nine weekly papers, besides several monthly publications. The population, exclusive of the suburbs, on March 31st, 1876, was 31,-
