SECOND DISTRICT CONVENTION.—Pursuant to call the Republicans of the Second Representative District of Berrien county met in convention in St. Joseph Sept. 14th, for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Representative in the Legislature. Alonzo Sharwood, of Wewau town, was the only candidate and was nominated by acclamation. Speeches were made by Messrs. Geo. S. Clapp, Wm. Chamberlain, N. A. Hamilton and others. The chair appointed Geo. S. Clapp, Hon. Wm. Chamberlain and Geo. Pierce as district committee for the ensuing two years.

THE *National* takes occasion to quote our figures regarding the Maine election, but where we said 37,000, the *National* represents us as having said 67,000, a misrepresentation of only 30,000, which does very well considering the source. The figures as given in later returns, as published by the Kenosha *Journal*, are: Republicans, 68,219; Democrats, 27,872; and Greenback, 14,404, which include all but a few towns which the *Journal* says will make the Republican increase over last year about 8,000, while the Democrats lost over 14,000.

GRAND JURY.—Senator James G. Blaine, of Maine, Gen. James A. Garfield, of Ohio, and Hon. J. C. Burrows, will address a grand mass meeting in Niles, on Friday, October 11th. This is, expected to be one of the largest meetings ever held in Berrien county. Don't forget the date, and be sure to go. You may never have another opportunity to hear the first two named gentlemen.

SOUTHERN RELIEF.—One hundred and fourteen dollars have been raised in this place for the relief of the yellow fever sufferers in the South. Of the amount \$12 was in the hands of a committee who had that amount for the celebration of the fourth of July, 1877, and not used. The remaining \$102 was raised by personal subscription. The whole amount was invested in 23 barrels of flour and shipped to the Mayor of Memphis, the shipping being made gratis by the railroad company. In addition to the above the Masonic Lodges of this place have contributed as follows: No. 68, \$5; No. 193, \$3.23, which amounts have been sent to the Grand Secretary of the Order in this State.

THE COAT FIT.—As a result of our publishing the fact that four years since, while a candidate for Senator, Dr. Berriek had caused to be distributed about the county, bogus Republican tickets, we were stopped on the street Saturday evening and rudely assailed, accused of lying and various other fine things, by the oldest son, and after he had about spent his ire the doctor himself came along and added his mite by denying the bogus ticket charge as false. We have simply to say that we have in our possession various communications from the pen of the doctor, and one of which acknowledges the charge made by us. Besides this there are several who stood at the polls, in this place, to see that none should vote these tickets without knowing their character. How they were treated in other places we are unable at present to say. It may be all well enough to publicly call any one a liar when he is, but when we say that tickets with Dr. Berriek's name printed in the place of the regular nominee, by his knowledge, and were taken to various parts of the county by his son, and that such tickets were gotten up for the purpose of fraudulently gaining the votes of the opposition, we say no more than we can produce abundant evidence to prove.

THE RECORD received a note of warning from the Democratic candidate for Secretary of State, stating that unless we immediately published a retraction for the publication of the Court Records last week, he would commence proceedings for libel, and referring us to the *Free Press* of Saturday for his explanation. In his explanation he admits all that was published, but adds that a *note* *propos* was entered. The case, so far as we have since been able to learn, was as follows: At the time Mr. Murdoch was running a store in Berrien Springs, and Daniel Van Patten was one of his customers who ran a crock and meat store at the time of settlement gave a note for the amount due, and afterwards, when he was called upon to pay the note, found the note to be drawn bearing interest, whereas he claimed it was not originally so drawn, and at once had Mr. Murdoch arrested for forgery, for inserting the interest part. The case was examined before the Grand Jury, an indictment found, and the case turned over to the Circuit Court, but before trial the Prosecuting Attorney withdrew the suit.

Farm and Household.

**How to Get rid of Ants.**  
During a recent visit to Mr. Hermann, in Oshkosh, I had the opportunity of becoming acquainted with a very successful method of getting rid of ants which are so troublesome in the spring.  
Our cattle small bottles, filled with full of sirup or sweetened water, and puts them in the places where the ants have their passage ways, in such a manner as the necks of the bottles lean against a wall or board, in order that the ants may easily fall into the trap and drown.  
By means of camphor, ants can be driven from rooms where honey is stored.  
In gardens, lime-dust acts very destructively upon them. There hills, after being scratched open, are sprinkled with lime-dust, and then hot water is poured on them.  
To render jars of honey or preserved fruit inaccessible to these insects, place the jars in chests which bottom have been previously covered with ashes or pulverized chalk.—*Elleest-voche Bienenzechter.*

I have known farmers whose reapers were never known, whose tools were left where last used, whose yards were carpeted, with the manure that had rotted for years; whose cattle were shattered from the winter battles only by gnawing holes in straw stacks; whose front yards were ornamented, not with lawn and shade trees, but with pig troughs and cobs. Perhaps these sturdy sons of the soil attributed their bad luck to the tariff, to some blasted monopoly; or to the contraction of currency; or to high rates of interest; never dreaming that the same waste and carelessness manifested by them would bring to poverty the men engaged in other business.—*Hon. B. W. Keyes, Madison, Wis.*

**COLD SLAW.**—With a sharp knife—there are knives made for the express purpose—cut up nicely a firm head of cabbage. Sprinkle it with as much pepper and salt as you think necessary. Beat up the yolk of one egg, add a lump of butter the size of a walnut, a gill of cream, the same quantity of vinegar, a tablespoonful of sugar, an even teaspoonful of mustard, and pinch of bruised celery seed. Beat these condiments, mixed together, in a tin cup; put the slaw in a bowl, and pour the mixture over it; stir it till well mixed, and the cabbage slightly oozed, then send to the table hot.

**CHEESE OMELETTE.**—Butter the sides of a deep dish, cover the bottom with thin slices of cheese, place upon this very thin slices of bread, well buttered, a little red pepper and mustard, another layer of cheese, and, just before putting in the oven, beat the yolk of an egg in a cup of cream and pour into the dish. Bake for half an hour, or until it is nicely browned.

As an illustration of the rapidity with which sheep husbandry is advancing in Texas, see *Humbuggery in the South*, says that 1866 San Antonio received but 600,000 pounds of wool, which was sent through Galveston. In 1877 she received 2,000,000 pounds. The wool of Nueces and the neighboring counties is shipped from Corpus Christi. In 1866 there were shipped only 600,000 pounds. This year there will be shipped 6,600,000 pounds.

**BAKING POWDERS.**—Three ounces of tartaric acid, four ounces of the best saleratus, mix thoroughly and box tightly in a tin box. Keep a small quantity in a box for use, as it loses its strength if left uncovered. This quantity will make a pound, costing only twenty-five cents. It is good for I have used it.

**LEMON PUDDING.**—One pint of white sugar, one-quarter of a pound of butter, three lemons, four wine glasses of water and the yolks of four eggs; cook down thick and pour over sponge cake sliced in a pan. Beat the whites of four eggs with two tablespoonful of white sugar to each white of egg, and put over the top of the pudding. Let it remain in the stove just long enough to become a light brown.

**PEANUT SAUCE.**—One teaspoonful of sugar, two-thirds of a cup of butter, one teaspoonful of flour, beat smooth, place over the fire and stir in three gills of boiling water. A little lemon, vanilla or orange adds much to the sauce. To be eaten with sponge cake or pudding.

If you have to labor for a living, remember that the hour in the morning is better than two at night. If you employ others, be on hand to see that they attend to their duties, and to direct with regularity, promptness and liberality. Do not meddle with any business you know nothing of. **PICKLED CABBAGE.**—Take the outside leaves off a red cabbage; cut in thin slices; place in a jar; pour in spiced vinegar over it. When cold, cover tightly. In ten day it will be fit for use.

**TO KEEP BUTTER COOL.**—A flower pot wrapped in a wet cloth and placed over a butter plate, will keep the contents of the plate as hard as if it were kept on ice. Milk will not sour if the can containing it be wrapped in a wet cloth.

**CORN FRITTERS.**—Grate six ears of corn, add one teaspoonful of flour, and two eggs; pepper and salt to suit the taste; to be fried like oysters.
