

Take Caro of the Horses.

The Illinois humanesociety, through an appeal issued by their committee. make the following suggestions, which owners of horses will serve their own interests by attending to.

1. Shoes .-- If horses are sharp shod in icy weather they will bull larger loads to greater advantage; it poor economy to neglect the proper shoeing of horses, which may thus bo seriously injured.

2. Blankets, etc.-Horses should be, protected by blankets or water proof covers from rain or snow, while standing. The cost of a blanket is very small, and its use would repay the outlay many times.

Any woolen or other protection placed under the pad or saddle, and extending back over the hips, will be found very useful, as protecting a weak part of the animal.

3. Clipping. - The clipping of horses at this season is considered to be, at least imprudent, and by this society inhumane; owners are respectfully urged to allow the animals to retain the covering which nature has provided.

4. Check reins .- Work horses, if at all should be checked vory low; they can thus pull to greater advantage, protect their eyes from rain or snow, and are less liable to stumble or injure themselves. It will be noticed that the city railway companies have largely abandoned the use of check reins.

4. Bits.-It is prudent to warm with hands, or otherwise, bits before placing them in the horses' mouths.

Examine the Combs.

It is the easiest thing in the world when you know how it is done-to cell when your fowls are in good health, even in the decipient stages of any disease or ailment, if you but examine your flock carefully. The comb of each fowls is a true index in the workings of their systems. If they be in ill health, the comb will lose color and will become far less firm in texture: as the malady increases the color decreases, till a very sick bird will show a comb almost devoid of scarlet color, being of a vivid dull crimson or else pale or ashy in appearance. If the cholera or any disease should come into the flock, carefully examine the combs of each bird. morning and night, and all those which are wanting in that bright rich color which denotes perfect health, remove at once from the flock to a place remote, where they should be at once put under medical treatment.

The comb of the fowl is an honest index of the true inwardness, and should daily be consulted by the fancier who values the health and well

Symptoms of a Diseased Liver. DAIN in the right side, under the edge I of the ribs, increases on pressure; sometimes the pain is in the left side; the patient is rarely able to lie on the left side; sometimes the pain is felt under the shoulder blade, and it frequently extends to the top of the shoulder, and is sometimes mistaken for rheumatism in the arm. The stomach is affected with loss of appetite and sickness; the bowels in general are costive, sometimes alternative with lax; the head is troubled with pain, accompanied with a dull, heavy sensation in the back part. There is generally a considerable loss of memory, accompanied with a painful sensation of having left undone something which ought to have been done. A slight, dry cough is sometimes an attendant. Hams.

For preserving hams or beef, the Farmer's Hame Journal says take six gallons of water, nine pounds of salt, three pounds of sugar, one gallon molasses, three ounces saltpetre and one ounce of saleratus. Mix these ingredients, and heat to a boiling point, skimming off all the im-purities. When cold, pour it on the meat. Do not rate the amount of materials according to the amount of meat, but mix in the proportion given, and use enough of the mixture to cover the meat. This method cures the hams, and leaves them tender and juicy. They never get hard. Leave the hams in the pickle from four to six weeks, according to their size. It takes longer to cure large hams than it does small ones. Always move the hams after they have been in the pickle three days. Take them out and pack them over. This is necessary, for when they are closely packed together some parts of the ham do not have a chance to be penetrated by the pickle. Keep beef in the same way, except boil over the pickle before warm weather in the spring. .

Perhaps the largest tract of land that can be cultivated in Arizona is that of the Salt river valley. Here the amount of rich tillable soil is estimated at fully 1,000,000 acres. It is said to be a rich alluvium, capable of producing with irrigation twenty-five or fifty bushels of wheat, corn, or barley to the acre. Pumpkins, melons, beans, sweet potatoes, and other roots and vegetables grow and thrive well. Hemp, tobacco and sugar cane are successfully cultivated, also peaches, pears, apricots, necta-rines and grapes, besides all other kinds of small fruits such as are

The Troy, N. Y., Times says that the potato crop in that section and throughout Renssellaer, Washington and Saratoga — the largest potato growing counties in the State—will not yield one-half a crop. Indeed, so bad is the yield that some farmers have not made more than a barrel of marketable potatoes to the acre. The magnitude of the shortage will be understood when it is remembered that the last United States census gave the crop of these three counties at 4,882,504 bushels of potatoes.


The Snowy Tree Cricket.

The extremities of the canes in a raspberry patch were found this spring to be almost, without exception, dead. Sometimes even the whole cane was dead, but more frequently only a foot to a foot and a half. Examination showed them to have been killed by the punctures which the snowy tree cricket had made for the purpose of depositing its eggs. The eggs are deposited in a single row lengthwise of the stem, each row being from two to three inches long, and the eggs as close as they can be and still be in a separate puncture. The eggs are yellowish, sub-elliptical, and about one twelfth of an inch long, and are inserted into the pith at the centre of the stem. The eggs are laid in August in raspherry, grapevine, blackberry and also in the twigs of apple, peach, pear, and some other trees. They hatch from the middle to the last of June.
