The Secretary of the Treasury has issued a circular to the customs officers authorizing them to receive, after the first of January, United States notes, as well as gold coin and standard dollars, in payment of duties on imports.

It is also rumored that the Laporte Savings Bank. is in a good condition to do likewise, owing to the possession of the bank of worthless securities. It is to be hoped that the day of savings banks is fast drawing to an end.

New Coral Reds in the Mediterranean. A Marriage in Turkestan.

The correspondent of the London News in Rome writes:

- Italy is finding in many ways that her-interests in the Mediterranean are on the increase, and that, as they widen and enlarge, they may any day conflict with those of other Mediterranean powers, par-ticularly Frances A case in point has just arisen, and in the present temper of the Italians, who, to judge from their ultra-liberal journals, seem to suspect that there is something like a combinationnot to say conspiracy-to lower their prestige in their own waters it will be well if the interest in question does not drag them into a "difficulty" with their French neighbor? In 1875 a coral bed was discovered on the south-west coast of Sicily, and the Neapolitan fishers whose port is at Torre del Greco, and their fishing ground in Algerian waters, betook themselves to the newly-found bed nearer home. But the coral proved of inferior quality, so for the next two years they returned to their old ground on the Algerian coast. Within the present year, however, a new and very valuable coral lled was discovered, again on the southwest of Sicily, between Sciacca and Porto Empedocle, and once more the Neapolitan fishers made for the new find, as the coral was not only very abundant, but of excellent quality. The Algerian ground was nearly, deserted, even by the French fishers, who; mingling with the Neapolitans and Sicilians, raised the fleet to a total of one thousand boats. The Sicilian fishers, from the proximity of the new bed to their own coast, claimed a right of preference over the Neapolitans, although the bed in-question lay beyond the limit of the sea-line within which their claim would have been valid. A quarrel, ending in bloodshed, would have ensued, and so the minister of marine sent a ship of war to the place to enforce the regulation that on certain days of the week the Sicilians should have the right of fishing, and on-certain other days the Neapolitans. Matters seemed amicably arranged, when, as I have said the French fishers appeared, and, not being subject to Italian jurisdiction, they worked every day and at their own convenience. Then the Neapolitans protested against this every-day intrusion, and through Signor della Rocca, deputy to the Italian chamber, they appealed to the Minister of Marine. After a good the Minister of Marine. And a good deal of urging, Signor della Rocca ob-tained a hearing for them, and it was. henceforward arranged that the fisheries should be free to Neapolitan, Sicilian and French boats alike for every day of the week, and the commander of the war ship was instructed to see that this was done. Thus the special Neapolitan grievance and the quarrel likely to ensue from it was set at rest, and the fishers left to reap the fruits of their labor as best they might. The Italians, however, are again dissatisfied, and it would appear justly so. Their boats-Neapolitan and Sicilian alike-when they repair to the Algerian coral beds, are made to pay a tax, even when the bed is beyond the Algerian sealine, of 400 francs per boat; whereas the French boats when fishing on the Sicilian beds and in Sicilian waters pay nothing The question is-either the French gov ernment must exempt the Italian fishers from the impost, or allow the Italian gov-ernment to subject the French fishers to a similar tax. And an unpleasant question it has become. Meanwhile the coral fishery between Siacca and Porto Empedocee is reported excellent. One coral merchant of Torre del Greco, who has filty barques employed on the bed, has secured in a few days ten tons of coral of the very finest quality.

Then, if his stock originated in Lapland or Terra del Fuego, in Nova Zembla or New Zealand, in Franklin or Orange or Bennington county, it matters little. If he is the patriot we imagine, he will delight to impart a knowledge of the means by which he has attained to so desirable results.

Value of Sleep as a Tonic. Among the Turkomans in Central Asia, who may fitly be styled the Comanches of the east, the ancient and much-discussed usage of "marinage by capture" takes the form of a very singular game, which is universally popular with the tribes of the Lower Oxus. It is known by the curious appellation of "kok-burl" (green wolf), a name which has never been satisfactorily accounted for. The mode of playing is as follows: When a Turkoman, belle finds herself embarrassed by a crowd of rival suitors, her father settles the matter by assembling them all in a convenient place on the open steppe. He then brings out his daughter, arrayed in the pomp of Turkoman "full dress," and setting her upon a swift horse, places in her hands the carcass of a lamb or kid, well greased from head to tail, with which she instant-ly gallops away. The young gentlemen follow her at full speed, and endeavor to anatch the prize from her hands, any one vilo can succeed in doing so being thereby ontitled to consider himself "the happy man." It sometimes happens, of course, that when the cavalier who is the object left to take up a fresh supply. of the young lady's secret preferenc

comes within arm's length, she will hold the kid in such a way that he can easily wrest it from her; but should a less-favored suitor overfake her, she grasps it with all, her strength, and the ill-starred lover gets nothing, but a good roll in the sand for his pains. The Swine Disease and Its Cure.

We publish the following as an indication that at least an effort in the right direction is being made to ascertain the nature of and remedy for the disease known as "hog cholera." One of the Government Commissioners it seems, has come to the conclusion that the disease is of a typhoid type, recommends the following emedy: Hyposulphite soda ten pounds bicarbonate soda five pounds, copperas one pound; mix. This is sufficient for thirty hogs. Give

one pound of the mixture two or three times a day if the hogs are sick. As a preventive give one pound once a day to hogs not sick. If the hogs are costive add to each dose half an ounce of glauber salts, until the costiveness is removed. Administer the above dose of one pound in a slop of milk and ground feed (which must be sweet) into which put two teaspoonfuls of carbolic acid, just before giving it. Keep the hogs on dry ground and feed no raw corn. This remedy has oper-ated successfully where it has been tried, and entirely stopped the disease in herds near Dexter, Iowa, the worst infected of any in the State, and where hogs were dying by the scores per day.

Diptheria and Its Cure.

A correspondent of the Journal writes from Mt. Ayr, Iowa: A friend, who came from Belmont connty, Ohio, informs me that they used dog-fennel there with entire success in cases of diptheria. Steep the herb in vinegar and apply to the parts affected. A daughter was so far gone with the disease that she could not speak. They applied this (dog-fennel) poultice and in a few hours she could talk, but her throat looked as if it were mortified. They then put on a linden-bark (bass wood poultice to remove the inflammation, and she soon recovered. This is a good remedy for swelling of the tonsils, which is difficult to cure, and they find that it gives relief in cases of toothache. Don't fail to use it for diptheria. My inform-ant had it cured in her family four times

Frands in Graham Flour.

The St. Louis Trade-Journal calls at-tention to the fact that graham flour is rapidly coming to be as much an article of suspicion as ground coffee or spices, or any of the thousand and one adulterations that are daily practiced. The commonest form in which graham flour is seen is that made from a medium or poor class wheat, and while not properly adulteration, it may be characterized as swindling of the meanest kind, for the reason that the product is largely used by dyspeptics, and others in imperfect health. Graham flour, properly made, is nearly as costly an ar-ticle as bolted flour ground-from the same wheat, therefore, when you are offered graham at much less than the best bolted flour, you are being victimized-it is either adulterated or it is made from inferior wheat. A common form of adulteration that is practiced by at least one retail flour dealer in this city, is to take a barrel of flour costing about \$5, add to it about 60 pounds of bran, 25 pounds middlings, and the same quantity of corn meal. The result of the mixture is 306 pounds of, stuff costing about \$6.45, or a traction over 2 cents a pound; while graham flour, made from the best wheat cannot be sold now at less than 31/2 to 4 cents a pound. And yet this vile stuff is being swallowed by people in search of better health, when they would do about as well on a diet of hot white biscuit.

Oatmeal and Eczema.

The complaint of the use of oatmeal causing disease of the skin, is by no means new, says the Phrenological Journal. We have used oatmeal in our family the past ten or fifteen years with no such effect; and we know children who may be said to have been brought up in great part upon it, and who have never exhibited any skin complaint; but, on the con-trary, have been remarkable for the clearness of their complexion and smoothness of the cuticle. We think that people who have troubles in the way of eruptions on the skin, owe them to improper dietetic habits, the use of too much carbonaceous matter, like sugar, molasses, gravy, sauces, etc. Oatmeal is a most excellent food, but its good effects may be considerably offset by the use of too much sugar, syrup or molasses in connection with it.

The Ascent of Sap.

A theory as to the rapid ascent of sap in the tissues of plants has recently been brought forward by M. J. Boehm. It is based upon the elasticity of cells. He states that "when the surface cells of a plant have lost a portion of their water through evaporation they are somewhat compressed by the air-pressure. Like elastic blådders, however, they tend to resume their original form, which is only possible by their taking in air and water from .without. Since moist membranes are little penetrable by air, the outer cells draw from the cells which are further in a portion of their liquid contents. These, in turn, borrow from their neighbors further down, which contain more water, and so on, either to the extreme root cells or to those parts of the stem which are supplied with water from below through root pressure."

Colic Cured by Standing on the Head.

Dr. D. L. Phares, in Trans. Mississippi State Med. Association, 1878, recommends as a prompt and effectual cure in many cases of colic, to place the patient in an inverted posture. Some cases which have resisted the ordinary treatment for hours and even days, have by this simple means been relieved and permanently cured in from one to five minutes. Sometimes relief appears to be afforded from the escape of air. In other instances, the air in the bowels changes its place, to the relief the patient. Some movement of gas in the intestines appears to be essential to relief by this method. Of course it is on-ly flatulent colic which can be permanently relieved by this treatment.
