The greater part of the news received from England now-a-days, is of business depression failures and unsuccessful strikes. From all accounts they are having as much worse times there than has been experienced in this country as can be imagined.

Secretary Sherman issued another call for \$10,000,000 of 5-20-6s, last Friday, interest to cease on the 11th of April. At the rate they were called in the first ten days of the new year, the entire issue would be called in forty days when the greatest of Secretary Sherman's expectations was to have them all within the year.

During a temperance meeting at Michigan City, Monday evening, a party of roughs attempted to get up a row, and in so doing a man named Donnelly was badly cut in the face by a razor in the hands of a man named Twiggs. After dragging the wounded man out, the meeting proceeded.

The Corn Exchange, one of the leading banks of Chicago. has decided to throw up its charter as a National Bank and go into the private banking business, and the directors give as a reason that they wish to escape the excessive taxation imposed upon National banks. Their taxes the last year amounted to \$12,300, and by the change they expect to be able to lessen that for the coming year over \$10,-000. The Corn Exchange is the first bank in Chicago to make this change.

The United States Supreme Court has decided that the law prohibiting polygamy is constitutional and should be enforced. There has long been a question of doubt regarding this, in the case of the Mormons, they contending that the law conflicted with the part of the Constitution which says that Congress shall make no law to interfere with any religion or the free exercise thereof, and that polygamon religion and could not be interfered with by Congress.

A report recently furnished by Dr. Lindeman, of the United States Mint. shows that the production of gold for the fiscal year, ending June 30, 1978, was \$50,226,107. Of this \$48,000,000 was retained in this country, and about \$800,000 was exported. The balance was unaccounted for, and is supposed to have been used for manufacturing purposes: . In the same report he shows that enough silver was produced by the mines to increase the solid wealth of the country over \$100,000,000, and that this increase will be greater in succeeding years.

It was first observed in France in 1818 among some soldiers just arrived from the Isle of Bourbon, but it was mistaken for scurvy. M. Bretonneau, an eminent physician investigated the disease and published his researches, giving it the name of Diphtheria. About this time a Dr. Gregory, of Lon-

don, reported three cases which assumed the form of croup, but commenced in the mouth with a false membrane and extended down and proved fatal. These cases originated in one family and appeared to be communicated from one to another, and this led the profession to begin to suspicion that it was contagious. During later epidemics in France. Breton-

neau, and another eminent physician by the name of Trousseau, saw that the disease was always confined to the throat, but the peculiar false membrane would occur on the skin any place where there was a lesion, and this led them to believe that it was not a disease of the throat, but a constitutional malady, a blood disease that manifested itself in the throat—and such is the case.

From 1841 to 1844, diphtheria prevailed in France with a fearful mortality, the disease reaching its maximum in 36 to 48 hours, when the air passages would become obstructed and a fatal termination was the result. Since 1844 the disease has spread as an epidemic over the United States, and in some places with fearful malignacy.

Since its appearance in modern times there has been no lack of inquiry and investigation, for the highest medical intelligence has been brought to bear, and the medical faculty have ex-

The Russian government has chartered a railroad from the Caspian Sea to the petroleum district, a distance of seventeen miles, and a company has ordered mate-rial from America for a pipe line.

Slag wool, a fine fibre of silica produced by blowing steam through the slag of iron furnaces is woven into strips and sheets and promises to be very useful as a non-conducting wrapper for boilers or steam pipes.

So delicate is the machinery used for cutting out wood for "papering" walls, that two hundred leaves are cut from an inch of white maple, and one hundred and twenty-five out of wood with very open grain, such as oak and walnut.

A woven book has been manufactured at Lyons, the whole of the letter-press being executed in silken thread. Portraits, verses, and brief addresses have often been reproduced by the loom, but an entire book from the weaver's hand is a novelty.

The oldest known pieces of wrought iron now in existence are those found under the pedestal of the sphing in Karnac near Thebes; the blades found imbedded in the wall of the great pyramid, and a piece of saw dug, up at Nimiod. They are all now in the British museum.

There are no fewer than forty-six varieties of the date tree. twenty-six of which are exhibited at the English conservatory at Kew Gardens. The date was once abundant in the Holy, Land, but is now disappearing there. It flourishes in the Desert of Sahara wherever water exists.

Vegetable isinglass, heretofore obtained from Asia, is now exported from French seaweed, and is used for sizing cotton give lustre to prints, woolens and silks.

It is announced that there will be an international exhibition of 'sea and river fishing material at Berlin in 1880. This exhibition will contain not less than nine departments. A programme will be sent abroad soon, giving all necessary particulars to those who may desire to forward.

The fee of \$35 for fregistration of trademarks at the patent office is hereafter pay-able in two installments; the first \$10 on filing the application, the balance when registration is granted.
