



Restoring Faded Writing.

Autographic Telegraphy. Autographic telegraphy, or, the process of transmitting messages in the actual handwriting of the sender, has occasionally, during the past thirty years, consti-tuted the special study of scientific minds, says the London Times. So long since as 1850, Mr. F. C. Bakewell invented a copying telegraph, by means of which auto-graphic telegraphy was effected, and this was probably the first time it was effect-ually accomplished. In this instance the message was written by the sender with a gummy ink or varnish on metallic paper or tin-foil, and this writing was, by the aid of mechanism, used to actuate clectric currents in such a way as to produce a record at the distant station by the chemical decomposition of a solution with which the receiving paper was damped. Both the written message and the paper were fixed around cylinders of similar form and dimensions, one being in the transmitting; and the other in the recording instrument, and the cylinders were caused to revolve with correspond-ing velocities. Each time the gummy and, consequently, raised lines of the writing were crossed by a pointer under. which the metallic paper was traversed in the transmitter, a mark corresponding in position was made on the prepared paper at the receiving end. It therefore followed that the sum of all the marks reproduced the writing itself. Mr. Bakewell successfully reproduced the writing in white on a blue ground, but the process failed to become one of public utility, owing to the extreme slowness with which the apparatus worked and the difficulty that was experienced in maintaining uni form and synchronous motion in the in-struments. The message to be sent, which may be either in the ordinary hand or short-hand, is written with a thick, gummy ink upon a strip of metallic faced paper about twelve inches long and two and one-half inches deep, which is wrapped around the cylinder of the transmitting instrument. A strip of white paper, chemically prepared and of similar di-mensions, is placed on the cylinder of the recording apparatus, and the instruments are placed in electrical connection and started. The raised writing, actuating the electric current, causes a reproduction of the original message in fuc-simile on the paper in the recording instrument, which may be hundreds of miles away from the other. The writing can be produced in either blue, brown, red, or black according to the chemical preparation of the paper, but always on a white ground and a number of copies can be taken from one original. In the same way sketches, plans, or drawings, may be faithfully transmitted; some sketches were, in fact, accurately reproduced on the occasion of our visit. Although the apparatus is perfect 'in its action, it still has one drawback, which was common to its predecessors-the slowness of reproduction. The time occupied in revolving the cylinder a sufficient number of times to allow the pointer to traverse the whole surface of the paper is seven minutes, and this rate of speed is far below that re-quired and attained in practice for commercial purposes. The postoffice author-ities, to whom we are indebted for our inspection, do not, therefore, see their way to utilize M. D'Arlincourt's ingenious invention at present. It is, however, being worked in France in fortresses, and for similar military purposes, for use in which and in some special cases it is exceedingly well allapted.

A Government Dormitory .- One of the Institutions of the Railway Mail Service.

In the upper story of the north front of the new postoffice there is a postoffice dormitory, which comparatively few per-sons other than those using it ever saw or and airy, and contains fifty spring iron cot-bedsteads, each furnished with two mattresses and the necessary bedding. This sleeping-room is provided for the use of the clerks belonging to the railway branch of the postal mail service, and was. established shortly after the railway mail service was organized. The object of it, is to furnish a central and comfortable sleeping place for the clerks when they reach this city from their "runs," so that they may be ready beyond the possibility of delay or mishap for their next "run" outward from the city. When the railway mail service was an institution of weakly and experimental growth, the clerks were obliged to find dormitory accommodations at their boarding-houses, at lodging-houses, or at hotels. They were thus scattered all over the city, and in the case of married men frequently at long dis-tances from the postoffice. It is always necessary that the clerk shall be at the postoffice from two to three hours befor the actual time of starting off the train which carries his mail, and it not infrequently happened, before the dormitory plan was introduced, that men overslept themselves, and thus missed their trains Hundreds of the older employees of the service, among them Assistant Postmaster Pearson, and Superintendent Jackson, in this city, have slept for three or four hours in the old postoffice building at Liberty and Nassau streets, with a couple of mail bags only as their bed, with occasionally the luxury of a mail-bag rolled up to serve as a pillow. This was sometimes necessary, because their trains were de layed in coming in, and, instead of their having seven hours of sleep, they had lost half of the time on the road, and in their tired condition did not dare trust them selves to the luxury of a soft bed, for lear of missing the "run" out. Again, these clerks are frequently obliged to work for thirty-six to forty-eight hours without sleep, subject to the jar and fatigue of standing on their feet; busily at work on moving trains, and the nearest bed on their reaching the postoffice is the most welcome. It was under these circumstances that the dormitory came into existence and now it is a recognized adjunct of the railway mail system, a small portion of the postal appropriation being set apart for the maintenance of dormitories at all the chief centres in the various divisions A janitor is employed in each dormitory who keeps a "call" book, on which the name of each clerk is entered as he goes to bed, with the time at which he is to be aroused and the number. of the bed he is sleeping in. When the time comes to awaken him he is quietly aroused by the janitor, and should he, from excessive fa-

The Trade of London Textile Goods in America. A few American: buyers have visited

the London markets lately. These for the most part make their purchases in the manufacturing districts, but there are sometimes lots and accumulations to be found in the London warehouses, that it answers the purpose of the owners to clear out, and for them to buy, which they of-ten get at a low price. Dress goods, slawls, and similar, goods are the kinds most in request by them, as well as trav-eling rugs, etc. A great change has tak-on place of late years in the class of goods sold to the American market. At one time men's mercery sold very freely, par-ticularly, such goods as neckties, which are now largely made up in the States. Thousands of dozens of ribbon neck-ties, made at Coventry, would find purchasers amongst the American buyers; but such goods are now manufactured at Paterson, near New York, as well as many other kinds, which cause Americans to be more independent of English productions than formerly, the make-up ties, "cut-ups" as they for called, being manufactured in he piece by the German makers mostly, who are very clever in this class of production, with whom English manufactur-ers stand no chance at all in the market, the direction of trade having changed very much of late years.
