Yesterday was election day in California.

Almost twelve inches of rain fell in Cincinnati during the month of August.

During the month of August there were coined at the United States mint at Philadelphia 1,824,223 pieces, aggregating \$2,247,407, of which amount \$1,740,000 were silver.

Senator Bruce, colored, of Mississippi, has bought a large tract of land in Kansas, and will do what lies in his power to help along the exodus from Mississippi.

The redemption bureau at Washington received in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, for redemption, \$157,000,000 in national bank notes. Of this amount only \$10,000,000 was so mutilated as to be totally unfit for circulation and only \$5,016 was counterfeited.

The trial of the Kemper county murderers of Judge Clisholm and family was commenced on Monday. Mrs. Clisholm and her attorney, Gen. Stewart S. Woodford, have gone down there to attend the prosecution. They have arranged a number of the "leading," "intelligent," "property holding," "peace loving aristocratic citizens" of Kemper county for murder, and if they return alive it will be the eighth wonder.

A posse of United States officers sent past Memphis from Texas on important business with orders to go right through without stopping for anything, are having trouble by being arrested in Memphis for having violated the quarantine regulation. There is liable to be a lively time of it before it is settled.

The New York greenback State convention was held at Utica last Friday and nominated Harry Lewis for Governor and John M. Weiling for Lieutenant Governor. The convention was marked with disorder and confusion. Issues being the predominant greeting. The ticket is not expected to represent a very active part in the politics of the State. The platform contains the usual amount of complaint of the National banks, and asks for the issue of greenbacks to the amount of \$50 per capita, and to have the aggregate amount increased in a direct ratio with the increase in population of the country, and that each new issue shall be used to cancel the interest bearing debt.

LAST week we mentioned the yield of 41 bushels of wheat per acre harvested from 27 acres of the Lear farm, in beholding the Miller farm, belonging to Rough Brothers. We since learn that when the entire crop is considered, the Rough Brothers are far ahead, their entire crop averaging 40 bushels per acre.

THE welcome rain came to this vicinity that has been dried and parched for the past four or five weeks, and has continued to fall long enough to give the ground a good dampening. The corn and potato crops will be greatly benefited by it, but it came too late to help either up to the standard. The work of preparing for the wheat crop has been greatly helped.

THE Treasurer's statement of the national debt for August shows a decrease of \$3,527,895 for the month of August. Besides the month of August, we paid nearly \$3,000,000 of arrears pensions, which had been applied to the debt would have reduced it over six millions. There has been a large and steady increase in the revenue of the Government through the growing business of the country. The disbursement of silver coin during the month amounted to \$1,900,000, over one million of which was paid out on salaries. All of the Government officers being paid one tenth of their salaries in this coin. In this way the dollars are distributed about the entire country.

At the School meeting in Bakers-town, Monday evening, they decided to put a new floor, a new set of chairs in their school-house, to have six months' school, and for this and other incidental expenses, voted to raise \$100. She was consistent in her life as a wife, affectionate and true as a neighbor, and highly esteemed. In a word, she lived right, died triumphant, and her feet have reached the angel trodden shore. McEWEN has been having a lively time with J. G. Owens, of Gallen. Last week he went down there with Constable Hamilton and a writ of replevin to get a lot of tools that he claimed that Owens had and belonged to him, and which he had left in Owens' care last winter for safe keeping. Owens claimed that McEwen owed him and had turned over the tools to cancel the debt, and would not give them up but got for Mac. with a horse whip and drove him off the premises, striking him a few good cuts with the whip, when Mac. and the constable came home without the tools, and had a warrant issued for the arrest of Owens for assault and battery and sent for him by Constable Evans, and Mac. and the other constable started again for Gallen to get the tools while Owens was here attending to the assault and battery case, but Owens plead guilty, paid his fine and costs and went back in time to chase Mac just as he was leaving with part of the tools. The fight for the tools has cost more now than they are all worth and the question of ownership is still undecided.

We learn that the Committee on County Temperance Work have engaged Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Crane, of Indianapolis, for a month's canvass in Berrien county, beginning at Gallen on Saturday and Sunday evenings next, Sept. 6 and 7. They both enjoy the reputation of earnest and effective Christian temperance workers. Let the people of this county improve the opportunity of hearing the "Hoosier Orator" and his talented wife, extend them a cordial hospitality, good audiences, and a living support. Due notice will be given of future appointments. Mr. and Mrs. Crane will be present at the red ribbon meeting in this place, next Friday evening, and occupy a portion of the time. All who heard Mr. Crane last Friday and Sunday are sure will want to do so again, and those who do not hear him this time will miss a rich treat. So turn out, everybody.

OUR SCHOOL DEPT.—A little of the history of our school debt may be of interest to those who have been helping to pay it. Our school-house was built in 1871 at an expense, for building and lot, of \$40,000. Of this \$7,000 was raised by tax, during the year 1869 and 1870, and the balance \$33,000 raised by issuing bonds of \$500 each, bearing ten per cent. interest, payable annually. Of the entire amount we have paid, during the past seven years, \$18,000, average annual interest amounting to \$2,500, making in all \$17,500 interest, and an average annual expense of running the school amounting to \$4,000, or for the seven years \$28,000, making a total paid during the past seven years of \$60,500. There is yet to pay on the debt \$22,000, running through eleven years, during which time the annual interest will average \$1,200, making in all, of interest \$13,200, and of debt and interest, \$35,200. The expense of running the school the past year amounted to \$3,200, and it is fair to presume that expense will not be any more in time to come. This will make to be paid during the eleven years \$60,500, or \$6,318 per year, instead of \$9,071, the amount that has been raised each of the past seven years. It will be noticed that henceforth the average annual interest will be \$1,200, instead of \$2,500, or \$595 less than has been. Besides the past payments have been made through the hard times of 1873 and since, which may not fairly be expected to be repeated very soon, at least.

ITEMS FROM THREE OAKS. Sept. 3, 1879. George Fisher is quite sick. Uncle Williams lost a valuable colt last week. Some parties went through town with a team, about 10 P. Following are amounts bought for the month of August: W. K. Williams, 9,000 bushels; E. K. Williams, 5,000 bushels; J. E. McKee, 5,000 bushels, making a total of 27,743 bushels. SCHOOL MEETING. Pursuant to notice duly given, the annual school meeting of District No. 1 of Buchanan and Niles townships, was held at the old school house in this village, on Monday evening, Sept. 1. In the absence of the Moderator, Dr. F. H. Berwick, the meeting was called to order by the Director, and E. M. Plimpton was elected Moderator pro tem.

The minutes of the meetings of the previous year were then read by the Director, and approved by the meeting. This was followed by the reading of the report of the Director, of which we publish the summary, as follows:

Amount on hand, \$347.48. raised by taxes, 1878, Buchanan, 7,948.57. raised by taxes, 1878, Niles, 131.32. 2 mill tax, 1878, 586.14. apportioned from dog tax, 126.90. primary interest fund, 295.14. tuition collected previous years, 123.80. tuition collected this year, 33.47. Total receipts, \$9,044.85.

DISBURSEMENTS. Amount paid bonds 13, 14, 15, 16, \$2,000.00. paid interest on bonds, 2,453.60. paid teachers, 2,820.00. paid on account fuel, 9.40. paid contingent expense, 192.98. paid janitor, 350.00. Total disbursements, \$7,825.98.

Balance, \$1,768.87. The report of the Director was accepted and adopted.

The meeting then voted to raise by taxation, to apply on indebtedness in payment of four bonds of \$500 each that became due February 1, 1880, \$2,000. To pay interest on total indebtedness, due Feb. 1, 1880, \$2,200. By vote of the meeting it was decided that there be 35 weeks of school taught during the coming school year by male and female teachers.

The meeting then proceeded to elect two trustees to serve three years, to fill vacancies caused by the expiration of the terms of office of F. H. Berwick and E. M. Plimpton, which resulted in the election of J. J. Van Ripper and E. M. Plimpton.

Meeting adjourned to meet in the same place the first Monday in September, 1880.

We now intend to have one of the finest schools in this part of the country. Mr. Gregory and Miss Babcock are unsurpassed as educators. The school in their hands must succeed.

There is to be a large stove factory in Gallen. Machinery expected this week. One thousand cords of bolts spoken for.

Mr. John Kelley is going west. His family will follow him as soon as he is located. Lawrence, youngest son of Mr. G. Moss, is quite sick with lung fever. Our village "dads" have ordered that George street be cleaned out and graded. NIMROD.
