



Among the names already mentioned by the Republican press of this State as their choice for the next governor are, Col. Grosvenor, of Jonesville; Thos. Palmer, of Detroit; E. D. G. Holden, of Grand Rapids; John T. Rich, of Lapeer county; Charles T. Gorham, of Marshal; and Frank B. Stockbridge, of Kalamazoo, and still there are more to hear from.

A new postal card is soon to be brought into use in the mail service. It is to be provided with two stamps, one at each end, and space for two messages. The sender who desires information valuable to himself occupies one of the spaces, and the return correspondent the other. One stamp is canceled at the office from which it is originally sent, and the other at the return office.

An aeronaut named Wise, of St. Louis, and a reporter named Burr, recently ascended from that city and have not been heard from since, except that the baloon was seen in Northern Indiana making its way toward the lake, and their fate is undoubtedly a second to that of Grimwood and Donaldson. An ascension was attempted by two men in San Francisco, Oct 5, that ended at once in the death of both men. They fell about 200 feet.

With return of better times comes the old habit of recklessly running into debt and investing in wild speculations, which was the direct cause of the hard times of 1873. The lesson of that time should not be entirely forgotten. The English financiers are already beginning to prophecy that there will be a reaction to our revival in business in a very short time, but it is encouraging to know that English financiers are not always correct in their prophecies regarding American affairs, and we trust this will be one of the times when they are mistaken.

Six states have held elections in 1879, namely, California, Kentucky, Maine, Michigan, Rhode Island, and Wisconsin. The New York Times sums up the returns as showing 457,658 Republican votes and 390,643 Democratic, making a Republican majority of 67, 015. In 1876 these states gave Tilden 561,208, Hayes 555,482, the Democratic majority being 5,726, showing a Republican net gain of 72,742. There will be a far greater difference in the same direction in the election of 1880.





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Suggestions about Carpet-Sweeping

Sweeping is a good exercise if you can avoid raising a dust, says Faith Rochester in the American Agriculturist. But if you are in need of vigorous exercise of that kind, get a hoe and betake yourself to the potato-patch or corn-field. Sweep carpets gently. Even a rag-carpet should be treated with consideration. A severe digging with a stiff broom wears the warp and scrapes out the lint of the filling quite needlessly. Not long ago I heard a woman say that a stiff broom was needed to sweep a Brussels carpet. I thought to myself "a stiff broom will never sweep my Brussels carpets" (good reason why!), as I imagined the tearing out of the soft tufting of the carpet by the coarse, sharp broom splints. A carpet sweeper is the best thing for this runness. It does the thing for this purpose. It does the work easily and well, and saves dust. A brush of hair and dust-pan are good to use for the nicest carpets, but their use is too laborious for recommendation to a busy house-keeper. If a common broom-corn broom must be used for Brussels, it should be fine, soft, light and clean. To sweep up threads, ravelings, and other fine litter, many persons wet the broom in clean tepid water, shaking out the water before sweeping with it, just keeping the broom moist enough to wipe up the fine dust and threads, rinsing in clean water and shaking it frequently as the work progresses. Brussels carpets are not suitable for rooms where sewing and baby culture are going forward In providing carpets for any room, reason would dictate that they be such as may easily be kept clean: not so dark as to show every dust and thread, nor so light as to be very easily soiled -something that will either let the dust sift through or retain it on the surface, rather than in the carpet itself, when to be used in rooms where dust is made.

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A Sponge Plantation.

For many years the sponge-fishers of the Meditteranean have carried on their avocation so recklessly that there is reason to fear the supplies from the great sea (which yields the best article) will practically cease unless means are taken at once to prevent the men from destroying—as they do at present in countless numbers—the young animals, while securing the full grown victims. Meanwhile Dr. Brehm the illustrious naturalist, has suggested a plan for raising sponges artificially. Selecting a few hundred speci-mens, he divided them into several thousand small pieces. fastened separately into perforated cases, which were then towed out to the bay of Socolizza. He next attached the pieces to wooden framework, which was then lowered in a shady spot to a proper depth. In a few months the sponges had grown to the size of good natural ones, exhibiting their distinctive black color. The authorities regarded this scheme with favor, but the fishers, with that ignorant prejudice which so often has delayed sound reform in almost every industry, attacked the plantation by night, destroyed the frames, and made off with 2,000 sponges. By substituting copper wire for woodwork. Dr. Brehm immediately checkmated the teredo, whose ravages in wood are notorious; and, by fastening the sponges to stones, it was observed that they speedily attached themselves firmly.







The range of even the Himalayas would not be visible upon this globe if the same scale were adopted for the eleva-tions as for the map, and accordingly the relief is made upon a scale which exaggerates hights twenty times. The occans, seas and rivers are colored blue; the continents are yellow; the glaciers, icebergs, and floating cakes of ice white. Plains and mountain ranges are clearly shown, and every part of the world is exhibited in its

true character. Red, black and white lines cross the globe to indicate the isothermal belts, the variations of the magnetic needle, the date lines where ships correct their logs by skipping from Saturday to Monday, and vice versa, and other facts of like character. The map has been corrected in the light of the latest discoveries. The northern coast of Siberia has been much altered in the atlases by the Nordenskeldt expedition, the ships sailing in deep water over places marked 500 miles inland, and being compelled to go hundreds of miles
