Hungarian Grass. Duchess Farmer.

Hungarian grass should come in reg-ular rotation, after, instead of before oats. It is better for the land. Oats favors the growth of weeds, thistles and quack grass, and is acknowledged to be a poor crop to precede wheat.-Hungarian grass smothers all weeds and leaves the land in good condition for wheat. It makes good hay, and a good deal of it if the land is rich. It is a good crop to plow under, to enrich the land, not so good as clover. but very much cheaper, and it is a great deal better for that purpose than buckwheat, having more vegetable substance than buckwheat and being more easily turned under. In the fields which are far from the barn and not easily manured, plow under the Hungarian for a fertilizer? It is a cheap way of enriching the land. The time to sow Hungarian seed is about the middle of June, and it will be ready to harvest or plow under about the middle of August. The quantity of seed for an acre is about three pecks or a bushel. It is an excellent crop for feeding green, when it can be cut as soon as large enough for a good swath. For hay it should be cut as soon as it is all headed, and before the seed is formed, it should be cured in the cock, without being exposed to the rain and dew.

Potatoes in England.

A correspondent writing to the London Daily News, says that the consumption of potatoes in England is so great that in the course of the last three years that country has imported something like 600,000 tons, repre-senting a total value of nearly £2,600,-000, the weekly consumption of London alone being equivalent to 5,000 tons. Every country of Europe contributing more or less to the supply, but the largest quantities are imported from France. The districts in which the potatoes are grown are the Vosges and the country about Cherbourg. Another correspondent in reply says that the larger quantity of potatoes imported into England are from Germany. For a few weeks about June, England gets potatoes from Cherbourg; but as soon as they ripen in England, trade with France ceases, and then large quantities are brought into England from Germany between the months of August and the following May. According to the board of trade returns, the import of potatoes into the United Kingdom amounted last year to 8,751,174 cwt., against 7,969,136 cwt. in 1877, and 6,031,S41 cwt. in 1876.



Staining Pine.

The Northeastern Lumberman recommends the following manner of staining pine to represent black walnut: Put pulverized asphaltum in a bowl with about twice its bulk of turpentine and set where it is warm, shaking from time to time until dissolved; then strain and apply with a cloth or stiff brush. Try a little first, and if the stain is too dark, thin it with turpentine. If desirable to bring out the grain still more give a coat of boiled oil and turpentine. When the wood is thoroughly dry, polish with a mixture of two parts gum shellac varnish and one part boiled oil. Apply by putting a few drops at a time on a cloth and rubbing briskly over the wood




