On being lowered the first and second times, he would not divulge any secrets, but on being lowered the third time confessed that he knew about the murder and that he drove James Mattison and another man whose name he gave but which has slipped the memory of our informant, over to Morris' house for the purpose of their committing the murder, but did not wait long enough to know which of them did the shooting. It is also reported that he is

in safe keeping "It is reported to-day that Mattison went through this city on one of the trains west last night."

Avoid washing blankets, or flannel of any kind, with soap which has any resin in it. I makes them hard and stiff.

Sponge Cake-Two cups of sugar two and a half cups of flour, six eggs, beat them separately ; two tablespoons of sweet milk, one tablespoon of baking powder, and one tablespoon of lemon.

Tomato Preserves-Take of the small yellow tomatoes eleven pounds, seven pounds of sugar, four lemons, and a small quantity of ginger root, boil a short time, and if the syrup does not seem to be thick enough to keep from boiling, skim out the tomatoes. and boil the syrup until it is a little richer and thicker. Put in jars and seal them. If the tomatoes are boiled too much they will harden. Take them out in time and they will be beautifully light, clear and soft. It is not necessary to put them in glass jars, simply stone jars of any kind.

Peach Pie-It ain't much to tell; and as to crust part, it is just the same as I have given before this for other pies. I would rather take clingstones than free-stone peaches, because the cling-stones are more juicy. All you have to do is to line your dish with the crust and cut your peaches in fine slices. You take off the peel, of course. Just sprinkle with sugar over the layers, and add a tablespoonful of water. I mostly take one peach kernel and bruise it up, which I put in the pie. Bake three-quarters of an hour.

Closing Cracks in Cast Iron Stoves. -If finely pulverized clay and a little slate are mixed with an equal quantity of wood-ashes, sifted through a fine sieve, and made into a paste with water, and then filled into the cracks of a store when the store is cold. it will effectually stop the cracks. It makes a cement that will not pull off or break, and soon assumes, after being heated, a great degree of hardness. This can also be used with good results in setting the plates of a stove or fitting the pipe, making all the joints perfectly tight. This is a useful hint to country housekeepers, who cannot always get repairs done on short notice.

A simple device, says The Plumber, is within the reach of every one having an ordinary window in his room. by which fresh outer air can be admitted in small quantity with such an upward current as will prevent its being felt as an injurious draft by the inmates. It is particularly adapted to sleeping-rooms when the weather is too cold to admit of an open window. This, start both top and bottom sashes of the window half an inch, which is not quite enough to clear the rebate or stop-beads at top and bottom, but which leaves an opening of an inch between the meeting rails, through which a current enters but diverted upward by the glass as it should be, so as not to fall directly to the floor, as its coolness might otherwise induce it to do. It thus becomes well mixed with the air of the room without being felt as a draft.

en, which means that the animal is not to be crowded, or fed only, or even mainly, rich food, so as to lay on fat , largely. Economy in feeding is to be practiced without feeding too little, and the comfort of the animal must be seen to, which in the fall and winter-fall especially-is necessary to profit, as it saves feed, as compared with the usual careless treatment. Especially does it become dairymen to see that not only their cows have not only a full supply of the best feed, including meal which gives a fair profit, but to see that they are stabled whenever the weather requires-the stable being kept clean and well littered. A milch cow appreciates this,

and the pail never fails to show it. In this way, the fall and early win-ter butter and the cheese made, will make up the loss in the fore part of the season to a considerable extent.-At any rate, the cows should be well taken care of. To continue them in short pasture, constantly fed shorter, is to damage both cows and pasture, exposing the latter in its demuded state to the severity of winter, and seeing the cows reduced 'in milk and flesh. Late pasture, even if there is plenty of feed, has not the strength and flavor of fresh herbage unhurt by frost. Of course to turn into meadows is out of the question, unless well grown up, and then only partially fed down. Dairymen thus have an exceptional chance for realizing on their product. Will they avail themselves of it?

Speculating Farmers. Prairie Farmer.

The farmers' legitimate business is raising grain and selling it. The grain gambler sells what he has not. and delivers what? the difference in the margin; or as many cents on each bushel of grain gambled as will make the difference between a fictitious val-ue as may be rated to-day or to-morrow, or a month hence as the case may be. In illustration: A bets B that pays the margin on 10,000 bushels, say, or the difference, six cents per bu. equal to \$600. Now, the farmer, and in fact, any person betting on the board of trade bets against adepts, just as he who bets on faro, or any gambling game, takes the chances to win or lose. If the farmer concludes to hold his wheat he must figure out how much the storage will cost. If he has fair facilities for storage at home it may pay to keep wheat until spring, when it would not pay him to freight it to Chicago, store it in pub-lic elevators, and pay charges to the opening of navigation. In this matter every one must be the judge for himself. The storing of any product and holding it for a higher market is perfectly legitimate but the person so in-tending must not be misled by options on 'Change, which is simply gambling.
