The Post and Tribune of last Thursday published a very complete report of the amount of wheat in elevators in Michigan January 1, and again April 1, showing the comparison. It shows that at the first date there were 2,328,281 bushels, and at the latter date, 1,971,564 bushels.

The question of second choice of Republicans in this State for the nomination for President is now up for examination. The Post and Tribune canvass shows 10,221 for Blaine and 2,848 for Grant.

The Benton Harbor Palladium has a long winded article on the county seat question, proposing now to move it to the mouth of the river, either to Benton Harbor or St. Joseph, and doesn't ask the Board of Supervisors to submit it to a second vote of the people, but says that unless they do, "We will submit it ourselves." Well, that sounds finely, but we mistrust that the citizens of the county do not care to be bothered with any more such nonsense.

BERRIEN county has been divided into twenty-two census districts as follows: 1, Bainbridge; 2, Benton; 3, Berrien; 4, Bertrand; 5, Buchanan; 6, Chickaming; 7, Gallien; 8, Haggar; 9, Lake; 10, Lincoln; 11, New Buffalo; 12, Niles township; 13, First and Fourth wards, Niles city; 14, Second and Third wards, Niles city; 15, Oronoko; 16, Pipestone; 17, Royalton; 18, Sodus; 19, St. Joseph; 20, Three Oaks; 21, Watervliet; 22, Weesaw.

An accident occurred to Mr. Joseph Clout, Jr., on Monday afternoon, while at work upon the elevator in the wagon shop. It appears that the elevator refused to work, and he had gone to the attic to attend to the same.
