The Old Frigate Constellation.

An inspection of the ship-of-war Constellation has been ordered by the Secretary of the Navy. The vessel is not in very forward condition, having neither spar, sail, nor a single gun, and furniture is conspicuous by its absence. The Constellation has a remarkable record. It was the second finished when the Navy of the United States was organized, and was launched at Baltimore Dec. 7, 1797. In the Mediterranean struggle of 1808, the vessel was in the Decatur Squadron, and in 1812 was rebuilt and twelve feet added to the length at the Washington Navy Yard. Returning from a long cruise in 1834 the Constellation was considered one of the finest war ships in the world, having ridden through a storm in the Mediterranean near-where a French ship went down in sight of

It was detailed in its eightyfirst year by the Government to convey exhibits to the Paris exposition, arriving from Annapolis on March 19. Her tanks and bulkheads were taken out, the cargo was stored, and March 27 she sailed for Havre. The Constellation returned to New York July 7. and shortly went back to Annapolis under orders. On Sept. 8, 1879 the vessel arrived to carry the relief officers and crew to the Mediterranean squadron and sailed with them Nov. 1, meeting the flag ship at Gibralter. The Constellation was dismantled when it returned on Jan. 19 with the relieved officers and crew.

Representative Thomas, of Illinois, has a scheme for the protection of dairymen against the competition of eleomargarine, by introducing a bill to tax the oleomargarine business to death. His bill provides a tax of ten cents on every pound or fraction of a pound of oleomargarine, or of any article or compound made in imitation of butter. This looks like carrying the business well to excess, although it will have the effect to keep up the price of butter and keep the butter makers in a good humor.

The Republicans of Cook county, Illinois, succeeded in getting up considerable of a row in their convention to appoint delegates to the State convention in Chicago, Monday, that broke up in a most disgraceful row, in what the Times terms real old-fashioned Democratic style. After being driven from two places by the mob the convention convened in the Palmer House and succeeded in appointing delegates in a peacable manner, and who will vote for Grant. The mob also appointed a set of delegates and the next row will come when the State convention is called upon to decide which delegation is entitled to seats.

THE CONVENTION.

The Republican State Convention to appoint delegates to the National Convention at Chicago, met in Detroit yesterday. There was a full representation, and the entire business was completed with but a single ripple, and that over Wayne county politics. This convention starts the Michigan Republicans out in the campaign with the following resolutions as a text:

1. The Republican party of Michi-gan, in council assembled, gratefully and reverently recall the memory of its two illustrious chiefs who have fallen since our last convention-William A. Howard and Zachariah Chandler-and in this city, where they sleep in their graves side by side, we solemnly pledge renewed fidelity to the great and sacred principles for which these men lived and died.

2. Those principles are exact justice and the security of all civil and political rights to all men, of whatever race or nationality, and in whatever section of the country; the ballot box made and kept accessible to every citizen, without peril and without intimidation; the rule of the majority as expressed in an honest ballot, honestly cast and honestly counted; absolute fidelity to all public and private obligations; a sound currency as the only system that is honest and that give to the laboring men fair and just protection; and the authority of the nation as expression of the will of the American people.

3. That the choice of the Republicans of Michigan for President is James G. Blaine: and the delegates chosen this day to the Chicago convention are requested to use all proper efforts to secure his nomination.

4. That we pledge our cordial and hearty support to the nominees of the National Republican Convention at Chicago.

An anti-Grant resolution was offered , as an addition to those above, but it was very abruptly tabled.

The matter of resolutions settled the convention proceeded to appoint the following list of delegates to the Na-

Board of Health Sotice.

At a meeting of the Board of Health for Buchanan township, on the Sth day of May, A. D. 1880, it was ordered that notices be placed in our newspapers for the purpose of calling the attention of the public to the laws of our State relative to the reporting of cases dangerous to the public health. Sec. 1734 of the Compiled Laws provides that any householder knowing of any person being sick within his family with any disease dangerous to the public health he shall immediately give notice thereof to the Board of Health. and if he shall neglect to give such notice he shall forfeit the sum of one hundred dollars. Section 1735 provides that any physician knowing of any such disease in any family which he is called to visit and neglecting to report the same, shall forfeit the sum of not less than fifty or more than one

hundred dollars. The enforcement of these laws have

been neglected, but it is now the purpose of the Board of Health to enforce the penalty of these laws in the first instance they are violated. It is also the duty of any such person knowing of such diseases to have printed notices upon the premises forbiding persons to enter. By this means the disease may be restricted and kept within bounds. By order of the

Domestic. Cheap Cookies .-- One cupful of su-

gar, one cupful of thick sour cream, one teaspoonful of saleratus, salt and flavor; mix very soft and bake in a quick oven.

Cookies.—One egg, two cupfuls of sugar, one cupful of warmed butter, one cupful of sour cream, one teaspoonful of saleratus and one teaspoonful of caraway seed.

Ginger Cake .- One cupful of molasses, half a cupful of sour cream, two cupfuls of flour, one tablespoonful gin-ger; half a tablespoonful sult and one teaspoonful of saleratus, added last.

Cake .- Two eggs, one and a half cupfuls of sugar, a piece of butter the size of an egg, one cupful of sour cream, one teaspoonful of saleratus dissolved in three teaspoonfuls of boiling water; flavor with allspice or nutmeg. This cake should not have flour enough to pile when dropped from the spoon.

Cinnamon Cookies.-One egg, one cupful of sugar, three-quarters of a cupful of sour cream, three-quarters of a teaspoonful of saleratus and a little salt; stir very stiff and drop in small bits on the moulding board on which is spread a few spoonfuls of ground cinnamon. Roll the cakes separately in this powder; lay on a well buttered tin and bake.

The following liniment is said to be useful for rheumatism, lumbago, sprains, bruises, unbroken chilblains and insect bites : Take one raw egg. well beaten up, half a pint of vinegar. one ounce of spirits of turpentine. a quarter of an ounce of spirits of wine. and a quarter of an ounce of camphor. Beat these ingredients well up together, then put them in a bottle, cork it, and shake them for ten minutes, or till they are thoroughly mixed. Then cork very tightly, in order to exclude the air. For rheumatism in the head, rub the back of the head and behind the ears, and, for other complaints, the parts affected.

Bisenits.—For this rather indigesti-ble, though really palatable compound take two cupfuls of butternilk and one of thick sour cream, one tenspoonful of salt. and enough saleratus to correct the acidity-about one teaspoonsful, though the quantity should vary according to the sourcess of the cream and milk. Stir together with the fin-gers as quickly as possible, and when stiff enough to handle, pat smooth in the bottom of the mixing pan, or lift to the mold-board, and to save time press smooth instead of using the rolling-pin; cut with a biscuit-cutter. or. in the absence of this a gem. can ring: place together without crowding in a floured pan, and put into a quick oven. If the right quantity of suberatus has been used and the mixing has not been too hard or protracted, the contents of the oven, after fifteen minutes have passed, will be pronounced a success.

Turkish Soup .- This soup owes its introduction into this country to Miss Dodd. In one of her cooking lectures she took a quart of second stock, the broth which comes of the second boiling, for about five hours, of soup joints, and removed the grease from the surface with a piece of paper. She next took half a teacupful of raw rice, and after washing it in cold water placed it in a sauce-pan; pouring over it the second stock, and allowed this to boil for twenty minutes. At the end of that time the soup is passed through a wire sieve, and then returned to the sauce-pan, being stirred well to prevent lumps. The yolks of two es
