The contract for building the St. Joseph Valley railroad was let, last Thursday, to N. L. Williams & Co., Syracuse, N. Y., at an exceedingly low rate. They contract to do all the work of building the road ready for the rolling stock. The contractors say they expect to have the road in operation by October 1, or before if not hindered by lack of material that is to be furnished by the company. Work will be commenced as soon as the section stakes can be placed.
