

## OUR PLATFORM IN BRIEF.

This is a Nation. No man shall be deprived of fearlessly and peaceably casting his vote, be he white or black, or a resident of any State in the Union. The Federal election laws shall remain as they are and be fully and unflinchingly enforced in all parts of the

country. The laws and amendments made necessary by the war of the Rebellion shall not be "swept from the statute books" by Joe Blackburn or any other man or set of men.

The continuance of the Republican party in power will warrant the support of the above principles. To turn the government over to the hands of the Democracy will place it in exactly the same condition as it was in 1860.

## Republican State Convention.

A Republican State Convention to nominate can-didates for State officers and Electors for President and Vice-president of the United States, and for the transaction of other business, will be held at the opera house in the city of Jackson, at 11 o'clock & m, on Thursday, Angust 5, 1880. In accordance with a resolution adopted at Grand Rapids, May 10, 1876, every county will be entitled to one delegate for each 500 of the total vole cast for tovernor at the last State election (in 1878) and one additional delegate for every traction of 300 votes, but each organized county will be entitled at least one delegate.

In accordance with a resolution adopted at a meeting of the State Central Committee at Detroit June 23, ISS0, the Secretary of each county conven-tion is requested to forward to the Secretary of the State Central Committee by the earliest mail, after the delegates to the State Convention are chosen, a certified list of such delegates as are entitled to sit in the State Convention.
