



THE HOME DOCTOR.

FEVER AND AGUE .- There are some situations where fever and ague prevails every season, and this is the case in the vicinity of creeks and swamps. An ac-quaintance of ours, who has resided for several years on one of these creeks, never has had a single case of fever and ague in his family, while all his neighbors have been more or less affected with it every season. He attributes his immunity from this troublesome disease to the use of a good fire in his house every chilly and damp night in summer and fall. When the Indians travel at night or early in the morning in swampy regions they cover their nose and mouth with some part of their garments to warm the air which they inhale, and this they say prevents chills

and fevers. AIR AS A STIMULANT-The exciting and stimulating properties of pure oxyand stimulating properties of pure cs, gen are well known, and every one has felt the invigorating influence of fresh air, yet no practical application has been made of these beneficial proper-ties of a substance so cheap and uni-versal. When the body is weak, the brain fatigued, and the whole system in a state of lassitude, just go into the open air, take a few vigorous inspirations and expirations, and the effect will be instantly perceived. The indi-vidual trying the experiment will feel invigorated and stimulated, the blood will course with freshness, the lungs will work with increased activity, the whole frame will feel revivified, and nature's stimulant will be found the best.

SODA FOR BURNS. -All kinds of burns, including scalds and sunburns, are al-most immediately relieved by the application of a solution of soda to the burnsurface. It must be remembered that dry soda will not do unless it is surrounded with a cloth moist enough to dissolve it. This method of sprinkling it on and covering it with a wet cloth is often the very best. But it is sufficient to wash the wound repeatedly with a strong solution. It would be well to keep a bottle of it always on hand, made so strong that more or less settles on the bottom. This is what is called a saturated solution and really such a solution as this is formed when the dry soda is sprinkled on and covered with a moistened cloth. Dr. Waters thinks the pain of a barn is caused by the hardening of the albumen of the flesh which presses on the nerves, and that the soda dissolves the albumen and thus relieves the pressure. Others think that the barn generates an scrid acid, which the soda neutralizes.

LEARN ABOUT THE PULSE-Every intelligent person should know how to ascertain the state of the pulse in health; then, by comparing it with what it is when he is ailing, he may have some idea of the urgency of his case. Parents should know the health pulse of each child—as now and then a person is born with a peculiarly slow or fast pulse, and the very case in hand may be of that peculiarity. An infant's pulse is 140; a child of 7, about 80; and from 20 to 60 years is 70 beats a minute, declining to 60 at four-score. A healthful grown person's pulse beats 70 times a minute; there may be good health down to 60; but if the pulse always exceeds 70 there is a disease; the machine is working itself out, there is a fever or inflammation somewhere, and the body is feeding on itself; as in consumption, when the pulse is quick, that is over 70, gradually increasing, with decreased chances of cure, until it reaches 110 to 120, when death comes before many days. When the pulse is over 70 for months, and there is a slight cough, the lungs are affected. There are, however, peculiar constitutions, in which the pulse may be over 70 in health.

Y. momentous problem, "Does the top of a wheel go faster than the bottom Somebody wrote to the New York Erening Post about the ice-yachts, and as the staid old Post never goes yachting, either on ice or water, it referred the matter to Prof. Loomis, of Yale, and President Barnard, of Columbia. These grave gentlemen, of course, did not practically indulge in any such levity as skimming over the ice, but they are noted mathematicians, so they un-3 dertook to figure it out, and the result was a very figurative answer. They both agreed that the ice-boats could not go faster than the wind. The Scientific American here dipped in its oar, and thus remarked: "In thus putting themselves squarely on record in opposition to a fact of common experience in iceboat sailing, these learned gentlemen furnish one more instance to the long list of mistakes by eminent scholars, who have declared results to be impossible after they have been practically achieved." It then showed plainly how the yacht could exceed the speed of the wind, and the learned professors at once came down and acknowledged themselves mistaken. The Late Editor of the London Times. John T. Delane, was for thirty-six years the chief editor of the London Times, which he found a great newspaper, and made the greatest journal in England. Up to his day, the *Times* had been great in its news. Some of its "beats" during the Napoleonic contests have never been surpassed, and its fearless publication of facts touching high personages led to one or two of the greatest libel suits in the history of English journalism. Mr. Delane, the nephew of the previous financial manager of the paper, became in 1841 its chief editor at 24 years of age, and he made the paper great in two new particulars, with extraordinary success for twenty years and more; it reflected the sentiment of the English ruling class, and it was served by a body of men altogether superior in ability and character to any previously employed on English papers. Delane showed signal ability in choosing his agents, and an almost cynical contempt in the management of the paper for consistency. The paper first went hopelessly wrong under him in its treatment tessiy wrong under 1 min its treatment of the United States from 1861 on, and he had a rough tumble in a newspaper war with Richard Cobden only a few years later which sadly damaged Delane in popular estimation. The anonymous secrecy of English journalism always left in the dark Delane's real work in making the Times what it was, but he has generally had the credit of being the great master mind of the enterprise

The Longevity of Icebergs.

Karl Weyprecht, in his work on the Polar sea, discusses the longevity of icebergs. Icebergs are subjected to disintegration after somewhat the same manner as rocks. They are full of crevasses, into which the water formed by melting penetrates. In winter this water freezes, and by its expansion all through the glacier a rupture of the mass ensues. "It is highly probable," he says, "that most of the icebergs afloat in winter are in such a condition that a very slight cause is sufficient to make them burst because of their state of internal tension. Every polar traveler can tell how a shot, the driving in of an ice anchor, or any other sudden vibration has brought about the catastrophe: cases have even occurred in which the sound of the voice alone was sufficient. An iceberg is always an unpleasant neighbor." So many are the causes which tend to destroy icebergs that the author concludes that "no berg exists which could withstand them more than ten years, and that commonly the life of a berg is much shorter." However this may be, doubtless the much larger Antarctic bergs last very much longer, as must necessarily occur, because of the greater uniformity of the climate to which they are exposed.

Health of Horses.

The health and comfort of horses have of late years been greatly improved by the better construction of stables. They are made more roomy and lofty, and provided with means of thorough ventilation. In many new stables loits are done away with, or the floor of the lofts is kept well above the horses' heads, and ample shafts are introduced to convey away foul air. By perforated bricks and gratings under the mangers and elsewhere round the walls, and also by bay windows and ventilators, abundance of pure air is secured for the horses; while, being introduced in moderate amount and from various directions, it comes in without draught. Too much dranght is almost an unknown stable luxury. To secure a constant supply of pure air, horses require more cubic space than they generally enjoy. A Royal Fabric.

At a later time the fabrication of velvets prospered at Venice, at Genoa, and at other towns in Italy, before they were known in France. Two Genoese im-ported this branch of industry into Lyons, where they established a manufactory under the auspices of Francis L, in 1536. Velvet, by the richness of its texture, at once took the priority on the continent of all tissues. It became the chief material of the costumes of the middle classes, the ornament of ceremonials, and was employed to set
