The man who lost these came to Niles and found his goods with Crocker Brown, Brown having bought them of one of the fellows who are now in jail at Berrien Springs, before his arrest or suspicion. Brown had sold the chain but got it back and delivered both to their owner. The evidence against these chaps is pretty convincing, and it is probable that they will get a steady job for the State.

The brakeman on the way freight coming from Niles the night of the shooting affray, tells of a farmer who rode from Decatur and represented that he lived about three miles from this place. The officers request that this man will report to Marshal Hathaway, and give such description as he may be able of the man who came aboard the train at Niles, and was supposed to be the one who was interested in the attempted robbery of the jewelry store and escaped. If he will so report he will be suitably paid for his trouble.

The Selingsgrove (Pa.) Times came to this office with the following item marked for special attention: "On Thursday last week a constable arrived in this place with a warrant for Mahaj Gadnah, by reason of a balance due the Prudential Insurance Co., whose receiving agent he had been. The Mahaj, to avoid further complications, had might seriously interfere with his going to Buchanan, Michigan, to open an Insurance Agency, concluded that the wisest thing he could do was to fork over, and he forked over."

The same paper contained a notice of a Mutual Insurance Company that Albert Arbogast and Matt E. Gardner were not agents of the company. We do not know either of the fellows, but so near as we can learn they are the ones who have been dealing in insurance policies on the lives of old people, who are morally certain to die within a short time. This town has been canvassed several times by agents offering to issue policies on such persons, and we are sorry to say that a few there are who have been foolish enough to invest. It is a swindle on the company if on no one else, and the proper thing to do is to inform on the swindling agents and cause their apprehension.

JAS. A. AND J. F. BOYER have been building a good sized house on Alexander street, and so arranged it as to accommodate two families. One of the brothers has returned to Pennsylvania after the families of himself and brother, to return in the spring. The men are thrifty, industrious men, carpenters by trade, and just the kind of citizens wanted to settle here.

SHERIFF STAMP, of Cass county protested against the payment of the \$800 reward offered for the arrest and conviction of the murderer of Billy Young, to marshal Hathaway, of this place, claiming that the reward belonged to him, but his protest did not hinder the supervisors from paying over the reward. Stamp has now brought suit against that county for the collection of that reward. He will probably get beaten in that game.

FIRE.—Mr. Wm. Coveney's house with all of its contents, with the exception of a small amount of bedding was burned on Sunday morning. The fire originated from a defective stove in the kitchen. The children were in bed at the time, and were barely saved with their night clothes, all of their others being burned. \$500 will hardly cover the loss. Insurance is a pretty convenient thing to have under such circumstances, but unfortunately Mr. Coveney had none.

DRINKING the first six days of December of each year the department requires all post masters to keep an account of all parcels sent out by them in order to form a basis from which to estimate the amount carried by the railroads and for other purposes. The count at the office in this place shows that 4,783 parcels were sent out during that time an average of 788 per day. The post master informs us that this is one of the lightest weeks of the whole year.

THE Mirror this week publishes a table showing the number and kind of business houses in Niles in 1850 and in 1880, and finds there were then 150 to 192 now. There were 14 dry goods stores then to 9 now; 4 saloons to 10 now; 9 shoe stores to 4 now; 13 law offices to 17 now; 2 machine shops to 1 now, besides other changes. The Mirror does not appear to be pleased with the showing, and we cannot blame it. Niles was then the center of trade for twenty-five miles around, but is not now. At that time Buchanan people went to Niles to do their trading, now they can do better at home. People living west and northwest and north-east of here at that time went to Niles to trade, and now they come to Buchanan. It makes all of the difference in the world with a town whether it holds the business or not. Another noticeable thing is that where dry goods stores go down, wet goods stores spring up and prosper. Men with capital like to settle in a live town where the business men are alive to their interests and their town's, and just such a place is Buchanan. We have no very good water power here, but have enough water to make all of the steam any one will ever want, and invite people to come here to use it, promising to treat them well and make them feel welcome if they are worthy of it.

We hear considerable complaint of parties in this place that their taxes are too high, some of them being nearly double what they were last year, with the same property. Others do not complain because their taxes are less than before. Our school tax should be less, there being about \$200 less to raise. The State tax should be less, there being between \$8,000 and \$9,000 less for this county to raise than last year. While the highway tax should be more, it having been voted to raise \$2,000 this year, when only \$600 was raised last year. Those who are interested can figure it out. We suppose the supervisor has. As we have not seen the last year's roll we have been unable to make comparisons, except in our own case. The tax on this establishment is about \$2 more than last year. The roll contains numerous errors, which perhaps are unavoidable. We are taxed 29 cents school tax where it should be \$29; but the error is corrected in the footing, so that the result is the same. Those who are not satisfied with the arrangement will have two ways to please themselves, one to pay up, and the other to allow the property to be sold, and then pay it or dispute the title and have a lawsuit over it. 




