The Rubber Toy.

The effect of India rubber toys on the health of children into whose hands they are placed, has been still further investigated in Berlin, and with some striking results. In one instance a child, having a doll of this material, and having kept it for some time in its mouth, grew sick, and the doll, laid in vinegar, became covered with an incrustation. On examination, there was found in 0.7325 gram of such a doll 0.4446 gram zinc oxide, or 60.58 per cent. Another portion gave, after being subjected to a red heat, 62.64 gram of ash, yellow while hot, white on cooling; in the ash, besides the zinc, were traces of lime, iron and phosphorus acid. From another doll, which had been warranted "harmless." about 58 per cent. of ash was obtained. consisting almost wholly of zinc oxide.

A mango seed is produced, and a flower pot filled with mold, and after a lot of ceremony (in plain English fuss), the seed is put under the mold and sev-eral coverings of baskets and cloths are placed over the pot. Then there is more ceremony and fingering about the cov-ered basket, and the pot is shown with the mango leaves just sprouting up. Then it is covered over again and more hocissing goes on, and the plant is seen to have grown. The covering, hocussing, go on, the plant meanwhile having further grown and become strong enough to bear fruit, the blossom to appear, the fruit to ripen, which is then plucked off and given to be eaten.

Now, we, for our part, can not under-stand how any one can see through the performance. Nay, even when to a fellow spectator, who once viewed this performance, we explained the details of the trick after it was over, he would not believe, but reckoned the affair wonderful, and even partaking of the super-natural. We can only attribute it to his having been so mystified as to have been actually mesmerized, though partaking of conscience. The real truth about this feat was that the green and ripe fruits, and every branch and shoot that was exhibited, were actually there, just as much as the seed and the flower pot-all in the wraps and folds and baskets which formed the covering. We were carefully watching the man's proceedings, and at that time had acquired some knowledge of jugging tricks. As we were not allowed to touch the in-struments of the exhibition after the particular performance began, the baskets, wraps, etc., could not be disturbed; but with our own eyes we saw the performer draw out the branches, etc., from the folds of the cloth, and noticed him sticking them into the pot beneath the covering, working away with his hands, and

as we thought, very clamsily. The question may be asked by a doubter of our account of the process, how about a green and a ripe fruit, as well as blossoms, being produced sim-nitaneously, say at a period when there were no such things; that is, when they are out of season? This, indeed, has been brought forward as a complete answer by those who believe in these jugglers. To answer this is not so difficult, however, as it appears. India is a vast continent, and from its southern-most limit on the Indian Ocean, where there is little difference between summer and winter, to its northern boundary on the snowy Himalayas, there is existing every variety of climate at any given time of the year. The mango flourishes equally in Ceylon and in the sub-Himalayan countries. We have our-selves, in passing through the plains into the upper Himalayas, in the course of successive weeks, seen the mango season just over on the plains; a little higher up mangoes were just in season; the fruits forming higher up still; the blossoms in full flush a couple of thousand feet higher; while higher still the blossoms had not yet made an appearance. With this fact are to be taken two others, the first, that Indian jugglers all belong to one Masonic brotherhood, and are in intimate communication with one another, all ever on the move; and the second, that even they will decline at times to perform this particular feat; that is, when they are not provided with the blossoms, green and ripe fruits. Thus, for 1879 24,000 immigrants were of English nationality, and 20,000 were Irish. Scotland contributed 13,000 in 1873. Germany sends nearly as many as England and Ireland combined—150,000 in 1873, against 152,000, and 34,000 in 1879, against 44,000. Among the other European countries Sweden stands next, then Norway, then France, Italy, and Austria. Not China alone, but all Asia, overwhelm us with such hordes as 20,000 in 1873 and 9,800 in 1879. In the twenty-three years 1855-77. almost 200,000 Chinamen came in, of whom not more than one-half have since 🖌 gone back. It would be interesting if gone block. A Little Latin.

An effort is being made to induce doctors to stop writing their prescriptions in Latin and use United States language. So many inoffensive sick people have been killed by a druggist putting up lobelia and other dangerous drugs in place of some mild and gentle purgative, which the system requires at this time of year, on the Latin prescription of a phys-ician, that a society at the East threaten to take the law into their own hands and puta stop to it. As a usual thing the physician who graduates with high hon-ors at some high toned morgue, does not know any more about the common English branches than is good for him, and his hand-writing is the merest goose tracks, a sort of delirium tremens on pa-per. Now, when you come to put such writing as that into Latin, to be read by a sleepy prescription clerk who has been routed out of bed at midnight in his shirt sleeves, there can only be one result. The patient will be worse the next day. A sleepy drug clerk is only human, and when he strikes one of those ingredients in the prescription where it tells him to put up three saw-teeth of podophyllum, and the word looks more like pennyroyal than it does like *podophyllum*, and more like peppermint than like either one of them, he is liable to trust a good deal to luck and put in that which is the least injurious. No drug clerk cares to lose a good position by not being able to read a stroke of lightning, and the result is he puts up something, and then charges enough more to make up for what he doesn't know. There are forty-nine millions of people in this country, whose lives to a greater or less extent rest on prescription clerks, and the eastern society who have flung their banner to the breeze and sounded the death of the dead languages will be embalmed in the hearts of a grateful posterity. They are doing a noble work. Dead languages are all well enough for dead people, but they are eminently out of place in this age of animated things. Of course the lopping off of the excrescence will bring doctors down to a level with ordinary mortals, and they will have to take their chances. It may be claimed by the doctors that they will be unable to command the respect and confidence of the community, if their remedies and things are not locked up in Latin. We will suppose that a man has eaten a hearty meal of arsenic, and he begins to feel a distress at the stomach. A doctor is sent for and he comes and prescribes. A few minutes later another doctor comes (when a man has been poisoned every doctor within ten miles is sent for). The last doctor asks the first one what he has given the man, and the first doctor answers that he has prescribed "hydrated sesqui-oxide ferrum." The second studies a moment, with his finger to his forehead, and says he approves of the remedy, and the friends of the patients feel that he would be a fool if he didn't, as the name is nearly two inches long. Well, the hydrated sesqui-oxide of fer-rum is nothing but iron rust, such as can be scraped off of old nails, but if the doctor had told his brother professional that he was giving the patient iron rust, and the other physician had approved of it, the probability is that the patient's friends would have bounced both doctors and sent for one that knew something. Doctors have everything to contend against, not only the ignorance of their patients and the patients' friends, but their own as well. The amount of nourishment which a person needs greatly depends on his con-stitution, state of health, habits, and work. A sedentary man requires less than one whose duties demand the exercise of his muscles, and a brainworker needs more than an idler. But unquestionably the majority of us take more than we need. Indeed, food and work are distributed most unequally. The man of leisure is also the man of means, and, accordingly fares sumptuously every day; while the laborer toils for eight hours, and finds it difficult to get enough to repair the waste of his tissues. Yet a Chinaman or a Bengalee will toil under a tropical sun, and find a few pice worth of rice or jowrah sufficient to sustain his strength. A Frenchman will not eat half what an Englishman engaged in the same work will demand. and a Spanish laborer, content in ordinary times with a watermelon and a bit of black bread, will toil in the vineyards and grow fat on a dietary of onion porridge and grapes. It is true that Mr. Brassey, when building the continental railways, found that one English navy was worth a couple of spare-fed foreigners. But, on the other hand, the British Columbian and California gold-diggers, than whom a more magnificent set of athletes does not exist, live in the remote mountains of the far west mainly on beans flavored with a few cubes of pork. But they also obtain the best of water and the purest of air, and their outdoor life and active exercise enable them to digest every ounce of their frugal fare. The English soldiers, though better fed than those of any army except the American, do not get one-half the amount of solid nutriment which the idlest of club-loungers considers indispensable for his sustenance. An athlete in training is allowed even less food; yet he prospers on the limited fare, and prolongs his life by the regiment to which he has been subjected. King Victor Emmanuel was a monarch of the most robust physique; yet he only ate one meal per day, and it is manifestly absurd for any man to require three more or less weighty meals, and an afternoon cup of tea, to support the exertion of walking to the club, riding an hour in the park, writing a note or two, and dancing a couple of miles around a ball-room. 

CHILBLAINS .- A chilblain, whether on the hands or feet, is nothing else save a mitigated form of frost bite. The evil effects of the cold are not felt until what medical men and surgeons term reaction has taken place; this is, until the blood which has been dispelled by the chill returns to the skin, and returns to it with sufficient force to cause a certain degree of inflammation. The parts so inflamed—probably some part of the hands or a toe or heel—will be found red and swollen, and most disagreeable itching and tingling will be felt, quite sufficient, in many cases, to banish sleep. After a time the chilblain assumes a bluish hue, and children once attacked are very liable to be so again. Now it is well to remember that it is far more easy to prevent the occurrence of chilblain than to cure it. A child or young person, after having been exposed for some time to the cold, should not be allowed to go too near to the fire, nor even remain in a too warm room. It is rapid reaction that causes the chilblain. If the feet or hands have become numbed with the cold, exercise should be taken to restore them slowly; or they may be rubbed with powdered starch. or, as suggested by an eminent authority, a liniment composed of the yelk of two eggs, four table spoonfuls of turpentine, and the same quantity of vinegar, may be used to restore the circulation. The smell, however, of this liniment may be objected to, so one composed of two ounces of camphor liniment to one ounce of laudanum, and the same quantity of hartshorn, may be thought pre-ferable. For the cure of a chilblain once formed, hundreds of remedies are from time to time recommended. A mixture of the compound tincture of iodine and liquid ammonia, equal parts, painted over the inflamed parts twice a day, is probably as good as any. Glycer-ine or lime linime t eases the itching, and some may find relief from bathing the chilblain in a strong solution of alum; an ounce of the powder dissolved in a pint of soft water. Those who suffer much in winter from this disagreea-ble complaint should take a course of cod liver oil and tincture of yellow bark before the cold weather comes on, or Parrish's chemical food with cod liver oil. Their own chemist will be able to state the proper dose, which should be according to the age, and the length of time it may be taken to do good is about six weeks. Warm stockings and gloves prevent chilblains; tight shoes encourage them.

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
