General Joseph Lane died at his home, near Roseburgh, yesterday. He has been gradually sinking for some time. He was a man of sterling mannood, and beloved by all who knew him. He was the last of the Generals of the Mexican war. He was appointed Governor of Oregon Territory by President Polk, and he made all speed to get here, arriving in Oregon City but two days before the expiration of the administration. He immediately organized the Territorial government. He was the first delegate to Congress, and the first United States Senator. He had a fine vault made at the cemetery during his life, in which his wife was laid, and to-morrow his remains will be laid there by Masonic honors, by the side of his wife. When the foundation of this vast Western Empire was laid, General Lane was among

the very first. He has endured many hardships and privations. While he was a bitter partisan, yet the claim of dishonesty was never laid at his feet. And when the old pioneer fathers and mothers meet this summer, few stories will be told in which the brave, noble man will not bear some part. A City Lighted and Heated by Natural Gas.

Bradford, Pa., and neighboring places are lighted and heated by natural gas. In 1875 an oil company were sinking a well, on a high hill west of Bradford. At the depth of several hundred feet they struck a vein of gas. No oil was found. The force of the gas was such that when it was ignited a pillar of fire 50 feet high was formed. The roar of the gas could be heard for a mile and more. This burned for months The heat was such that the grass and foliage grew in the depth of winter as luxurously as it did in summer. Strawberries ripened near this well in February. The well had been burning long before the feasibility of utilizing it was thought of. A belt of dry territory, but yielding vast volumes of gas, was subsequently found to exist in the vicinity of the original gas well. A company was formed to carry the gas into the city. It is now distribu-ted all over the place by pipes. A gas-pipe, with jets attached, is run into parlor and kitchen stoves. The supply of gas is controlled by a stop-cock on the pipe. When a fire is wanted, a lighted match is thrown into the stove and the gas turned on. The fire is started at once. The gas possesses great heating qualities, and, apartments are warmed as quickly sand as well by it as by coal. Secretary Windom has issued a call for the remainder of the outstanding five and six per cent bonds, amounting to about \$456,000,000 for redemption or continuance at 314 per cent interest. Of these he proposes to redeem \$77,-900,000 with the surplus revenues.

Lord Lorne has got tired of his position as governor general of Canada and will resign. He has a salary of \$50,000 a year and a furnished house. His wife has \$30,000 a year from parliament, and also had a dot of \$150,000, which may be presumed to add \$6,000 a year more to their income, so that if the duke of Argyll adds \$14,000 a year they have \$100,000 for a childless pair to knock around in this pitiless world for poor folks.

Last Thursday the nomination of Stanley Matthews to the supreme bench was confirmed by a majority of one on a total vote of 47, a majority of the Democrats voting and working for his confirmation, and a majority of the Republicans against. He will have the satisfaction of knowing that he goes upon the supreme bench under the protest of the best men of both parties.

On Monday the resignation of Senators Conkling and Platt, of New York, were officially announced in the Senate, and all because Conkling could not manage the appointments of United States officials in New York to suit himself. The general opinion of the country at large is that he has "made a ath of hith-thelf" and will never recover. The new York Legislature is in session, and it is thought that those wise ones expect that body to re-elect them and return them to the Senate, but it is to be hoped for the best interests of the Republican party and of the country that that body contains good sense enough to refuse to do anything of the sort.

If the Legislature make a law of the capital punishment bill they ought to do so with many considerations of care. There are too many innocent men being executed to make a very loose capital punishment law a very desirable thing for Michigan. Following is that part of the bill now under consideration as refers to capital punishment: (7510.) SECTION 1. All murders which shall be perpetrated by means of poison, or lying in wait, or any other kind of wilful, deliberate, and premeditated killing, or which shall be committed in the perpetration or attempt to perpetrate any arson, rape, robbery, or burglary shall be deemed murder of the first degree, and shall be punished by [being hung by the neck until dead], after first being confined in solitary confinement in the State prison for one year, or by solitary confinement at hard labor in the State prison for life [as the jury by whom the conviction was made or the judge by whom confession was received shall determine.]

(7512) SEC. 3. The jury before whom any person indicted for murder shall be tried, shall, if they find such person guilty thereof, ascertain in their decree whether it be murder of the
