

Proclamation by the Governor. The condition of the people in the Huron peninsula of this State, who were sufferers by the forest fires of last autumn, demands the consideratson of the Legislature. Many of their temporary needs were relieved by the personal generosity of the citizens in this and other States, but further assistance has become an imperative neces

sity. Committees and individuals who have given the subject the closest thought and most industrious investi-

gation, concur with the executive in the belief that the law-making power should be at once invoked. The commission appointed under authority vested in me at your last session to consider the revision of the

tax system has submitted a compre-hensive report and bills in pursuance of that object, which also merit your early attention.

A bill establishining representation in Congress on the basis of the tenth federal census will probably become a law within a few weeks and may also require action at your hands in a rearrangement of the congressional districts.

Now, therefore, for the consideration of these subjects, and of such oth-er matters as may be brought to your notice, I, David H. Jerome, Governor of the State of Michigan, by virtue of the power vested in me by the consti-

tution, do hereby direct that the Legislature of the State convene in extraor-dinary session at the capitol in the city of Lansing, on Thursday, the twenty-third day of February, instant, at twelve o'clock, noon.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the State to be hereunto affixed at Lansing, this first day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.







## STATE ITEMS.

Saturday morning Judge Cox denied the motion for a new trial, and sentenced Guiteau to be hanged in Washington on Friday, June 30, 1882, between the hours of 12 M. and 2 P. M. Guitean acted more pugnacious than at any other part of the proceedings against him.

> In the libel suit of Police Justice Miner against The Post and Tribune, Monday, arguments were concluded, the judge's charge was given, and after consultation the jury returned a verdict of \$250 for plaintiff. The Post and Tribune will carry the case to the supreme court.

The balance of cash in the State treasury, Jan. 28, was \$1,440,838.52; receipts for the week ending Feb. 4 were \$437,736.08; payments for same time \$16,942.29; leaving a balance, Feb. 4, 1882, of \$1,861,632.31; of which \$589,-000 belong to the sinking fund, \$786,-528.80 are held in the trust funds, and \$4\$6,103.51 are available for general purposes.

### Who Was Nemisis?

In Grecian mythology Nemesis was a female divinity who appears to have been regarded as the personification of the righteous anger of the gods. She is represented as inflexibly severe to the proud and insolent. According to He-siod, she was the daughter of Night, though she is sometimes called a daughter of Erebus or of Oceanus. The Greeks believed that the gods were ene-mies of excessive human happiness, and that there was a power that preserved a proper compensation in human affairs

from which it was impossible for the sinner to escape. This power was em-bodied in Nemesis, and she was in an especial manner the avenger of family crimes and the humbler of the overbearing. There was a celebrated temple sacred to her at Rhamus, one of the boroughs of Attica, about sixty stadia distant from Marathon; the inhabitants of that place considered her the daughter of Oceanus. According to a myth preserved by Pausanias, Nemesis was the mother of Helen by Jupiter, and Leda, the reputed mother of Helen by Jupiter, was only in fact her nurse, but this myth seems to have been invented in later times to represent the divine vengeance which was inflicted on the Greeks and Trojans through the instrumentality of Helen.

THE original use to which Boston Common was put was for a pasture for cattle and parade ground. It was called Centry Field.

THE Greek word for horse-shoe first occurs in the ninth century Horses were then only shod in time of frost or for especial occasions.

HURS, instead of tents, were used by the ancient English soldiers, as the modes of warfare consisted chiefly in sieges and standing comps.

COATS of arms and heraldry were introduced into England in 1100. The arms of England and France were first quartered by Edward III. in 1358.

IN ELIZABETH'S time "repeater" watches were so rare that some rustics took one that they heard for the devil, and threw it out of the window with the tongs.

THE first silver money coined in Rome was A. U. O. 484. The mint was in the temple of Juno Moneta, which circumstance occasioned the origin of our word money.
