Republican State Convention. A Republican State Convention to nominate State officers and for the transaction of other busi-ness, will be held at the opera house, in the village of Kalamazoo, on Wednesday, August 30, 1882, at 11 o'clock a. M. In accordance with a resolution adopted at Graud Rapids, May 10, 1876, every county will be entilled to one delegate for each 500 of the total vote cast for Governor at the last State election (in 1880) and one additional delegate for every fraction of 300 votes, but each organized county will be entilled to at least one delegate. Under a resolution of 1858 no delegate will be entitled to a seat in the Convention who does not reside in the County he proposes to represent. In accordance with a resolution adopted at De-voit, June 23, 1880, the Secretary of each County Convention is requested to forward to the Secretary of the State Central Committee, by the earliest mai after the delegates to the State Convention are chosen, a certified list of such delegates as are entitled to seats in the State Convention from their respective connties. Collision. At about six o'clock Tuesday morning, a terrible collision occurred between two freight trains, on the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern railroad, about two miles west of South Bend, on the edge of the Kankakee marsh. The trains were No. 60 going east, composed of 46 cars and No. 73 going west, with 40 cars. Both trains had right of way, which happened by No. 60 not receiving orders at Warren Centre, as should have been done, and were speeding toward each other, one at the

rate of 40 miles and the other at pretty fast up grade rate, and owing to the dense fog that hung over the marsh were within two or three rods of each other before either was seen by the engineer of the other, when each closed the throttles and jumped for their lives. The engine on No. 60 when it struck the other "reared high in air, overtopping the other but slightly and for an instant they stood poised in the air as if in a deadly struggle for mastery, then, almost at the same moment.

each fell on its side down the embankmeet on the north side of the track. The tenders doubled over on the engines and cars, most of them loaded with coal, coke, merchandise and lumber, piled up on each other for a distance of at least thirty feet high and for a distance of nearly 300 feet along the track. The Morality of Failing. It is better to be robbed than to be a robber. And sometimes it is better to fail than to succeed. This thing called failure is not such a fearful thing as the prosperous world would suggest it to be. Failure is only lesser success. All men can not organize a triumph. Defeat is the fate of many. The only successful failures are the are that are honestly made. When a mains jurgment has miscarried and brought him a wrong issue, he is not to be outlawed for it. When the misfortunes or "cussedness" of others drive him into defeat, there is no reason why he should be hated. The world will have charity for the failure where it has been inevitable and honest. It hates a sham failure even worse than does a sham success. There is one feature connected with failures prac-

ticed by nearly all failing concerns, but that does not make it any less objectionable. We refer to the custom, so universal with all failing firms and institutions, of preferring wealthy creditors. The question naturally comes up : Why should they be preferred? When a mercantile house fails, it usually prefers its banker, and fixes everything up with him, so that he is no loser. When a bank fails, it has been observed, that it always prefers its large, rich creditors, This system is corrupt in morals, and manifests a contemptuous deference to wealth that is humiliating. Why should any failing concern prefer the wealthy over the poor? Every settlement should be promoted as a matter of justice, but if any leniency or favors are to be shown, they should be extended to the poor. The rich can sustain their loss. They have other resources and larger opportunities; but the poor have the last prop taken, and know not where to look for another. Why should large creditors be satisfied first of all? The world has got all wrong on this business transaction. If it intends to be honest and just, it must turn around. Public opinion must make it unpopular, because it is wrong for banks and merchants to shield and favor the rich and powerful, while they oppress the poor and the weak. How much better it would appear if the bank had treated all of its automotion alike. Let no wealthy stand in with one poor and take their chances. The

wealthy man who has divided his money, placing a parcel in one bank and some in another, can recover the loss of one division of his wealth far better than the needy man, or the poor widow, who do not have enough to parcel out, but must trust all in one venture, and if they lose there, they lose all. If any class of debtors are to be preferred, common honesty would suggest that it should be the oues least able to meet losses. Of this class are the poor. Any other pay-

ment than on a pro rata basis is unjust and unfair to them. In the matter of settling with creditors there is room for an improvement in the morality of failures.-Indianapolis Herald.
