Iowa Correspondence.

FRIEND HOLMES.—It has been some two years since dropping you a line. Like the Quaker, the "spirit" has moved many times, but the want of a more "convenient season" has permitted each opportunity to pass until now. The past season, in the State, has been one which the farmers will never forget. The supply of good seed corn was very limited. The railroads, desirous of seeing a bountiful corn crop, carried free of cost, all corn for seeding purposes, from Kansas and Nebraska to any stations along their respective lines. It is safe to estimate that one-half of the entire acreage of corn planted in this great State was of foreign seed. What is the result? The season being cold, wet and backward did not allow imported seed to mature, hence, you can see vast numbers of fields, with stalks from eight to twelve feet high; but upon low lands no corn, and on high lands soft corn. Domestic seed producing four-fifths of an average crop. All branches of business are more or less affected, and the farmers don't want to see any more "imported" corn planted in Iowa. Notwithstanding this, it is wonderful to see the amount of improvements upon every part of this State, the city of Des Moines ranking seventh, leading even the magic city of Kansas City, in the amount of funds expended, in new buildings, of all the larger cities of this country, passing Dubuque in population, and is now the metropolis of Iowa.

Occasionally I meet some person from home, with whom I am acquainted, but in traveling over some five thousand miles of territory, the "Buchanan Wagons," "Zino Pads," and the "Buchanan Beds," are the objects which are seen that remind you of her commercial resources. GOVERNOR ELECT OF MASSACHUSETTS.

The Republicans of Massachusetts have recently elected a Governor, Mr. George G. Robinson, one of the most distinguished of their number. He is a native of Lexington, Mass., and was born on the 20th of January, 1834, of the old revolutionary stock. His ancestry on both sides, fought in the battles of Concord and Lexington, and his parents, Charles and Mary Robinson are still living. His early life was spent on the farm of his father, near Lexington Common. When sixteen years of age he entered the Lexington Academy and soon after the Hopkins Classical School at Cambridge. Here he prosecuted his studies with a zeal and diligence which gave promise of brilliant achievements. Graduating in 1856, he was immediately chosen as principal of his school in Chicago, Mass. Leaving here he entered the law office of his only brother, Charles Robinson Jr., at Charlestown, Mass., where he remained until his admission to the bar in 1860. He began the practice of law at Chicago, where his energy and talent won the admiration and respect of all. In 1874, he was elected to the State Legislature, where he served on the Judiciary Committee. He was elected State Senator in 1876 and in the same year was elected to the vacant seat of Chester W. Chapin, in the Forty-fifth Congress. Here his abilities immediately received merited recognition. He was made a member of the committees on Improvement of the Mississippi and on Expenditures. On his re-election to the House in 1878, he was given a seat in the Judiciary Committee, where he displayed extraordinary ability as a legislator. In Congress he exhibited sound judgment, a keen perception and a fluency of speech which enabled him to cope with the veterans of legislation from the outside. As a speaker he is more forcible than polished, and his manner of delivery, while not particularly graceful, is effective in the extreme. His views distinguished through life, and especially during his legislative career, as an indefatigable worker. In his opinion the duties of a Congressman are so numerous, that each district should be represented by three men. One of the work of legislation, another to serve his constituents at the departments and public offices and a third to do the social hours of the position. This and other evils can be remedied only by a state pharmacy law, and a state association in working order is the quickest and surest way to the enactment of such a law. Michigan, occupying the position she does in the commercial and scientific world, has been singularly apathetic and backward in regard to such a movement. It is essential that the druggist should keep pace with the rapid strides that are being made in the Medical, Chemical and Pharmaceutical world, and there is no better way to accomplish this, than by such an organization as is now being effected.

PROF. J. RUSSELL WEBB, of St. Joseph, has recently patented an article of immense value in primary school work. It consists of a large number of words and letters printed on separate strips of card board, with a neat little rack into which they may be placed so as to form sentences.
