The Democratic party is fast coming to the front, but is as usual about four years behind the Republicans. In three States they have met and heartily endorsed the Republican policy of paying the National debt. careful reading: "I know that we cannot without loss of character for honor and chivalry begin our negotiations with threats of war. I maintain that when the United States agreed to accept arbitration as the means of adjusting our grave difficulties with England we came under bonds to the public opinion of the world to offer arbitration to any weaker power as the means of settling difficulties in all cases where we cannot adjust them by direct negotiation. If we are not willing to accept that conclusion we place ourselves in the disreputable attitude of accepting arbitration with a strong power and re-sorting to force with a weak power. For the United States to attack Mexico without giving her an opportunity to be heard before an impartial tribunal of arbitration would be for a great nation of unlimited power to put her-

self to open shame before the world." Then reverting to his favorite topic, a practical union of all the states on

this hemisphere, he said: There could not, fellow-citizens, in my judgment, be a more deplorable event than a war between the United States and any other republic of America. The United States must be regarded as the elder sister in that family of commonwealths. Even in the day of our weakness we gave aid and comfort to them in their suruggle for independence, and let us not fail now

to cultivate friendly and intimate relations with them. Reframing from war ourselves we shall gain the influence that will enable us to prevent war among them-so that peace shall be assured and perpetual on this con-

tinent. If I recall any part of my own participation in public affairs with special satisfaction it is that I endeavoured and almost succeeded in having the American republics assemble in a peace Congress that war between nations on this continent should be made impossible. War in any direction would prove a great calamity to the United States—but war forced on Mexico would be a crime marked in an especial degree by cruelty.

The Boom in Wheat.

The news of a large shortage in the wheat crop of Western Europe has been received at intervals for several

extensively doubted, but the market advanced steadily. Yesterday it took a smart jump, on an amplification of the news, and touched a point five and a half cents above the price of a fort-night ago, Then it fell back, owing to heavy speculative selling by men who had hitherto been bulls, and became relatively weak at the moment when it was apparently justified in being most strong.

The cause of this anomaly may probably be traced to the fact that "insiders" obtained a knowledge of conditions, and took advantage of them, before the rest of the world got wakened up in regard to it. These men, who paid for the information, acted there-

In other words, they bought wheat as cheaply as possible to be sold out when the market had got high enough to content them with the profit which could only be realized by inciting a desire to buy from them that which they were ready to sell. WHITNEY'S WORKSHOP.

FINISHING VESSELS BEGUN BY JOHN ROACH AT CHESTER, PA.

Progress of the Work on the New Steel Cruisers for the United States Navy. The Puritan, Boston, Chicago and Atlanta.




THE BOSTON,

At Chester, Pa., on the Delawaro river, a short distance below Philadelphia, the far famed shipyard of John Roach is situated. In this yard the Dolphin was constructed and was subsequently refused by the new administration as unfit for the United States navy, for which she had been built by Roach under a contract with the former administration. The original contract called for the construction of five powerful steel cruisers, or gunboats, designed to replace some of the old craft in the navy that had become unfit for use. The Puritan was built first, and upon the plan of a monitor. After her the Atlan-Then followed the ill-fated Dolphin whose build was more in the nature of a dispatch boat, though she was armored and pro-



THE CHICAGO.

The new secretary of the navy, Whitney, had scarcely assumed the duties of the office when he found, as he claimed, just reason to reject the Dolphin for alleged serious faults in her hull and works. Inspection of the three other vessels by a board of naval officers, under his direction, brought on almost similar results. It looked for a time, too, as if in addition to this, the government meant to prosecut Roach with a view to forcing a return of all money paid out of the treasury by the former administration on account of these boats. By some understanding Roach made an assign ment and the new secretary stepped in with the naval advisory board and a number of engineers from the United States navy to complete the work that Roach had commenced. The enormous workshops which had remained idle during the controversy between Roach and Whitney, were again set in motion, and a great force of men are now busily engaged in all the departments pushing the work to a finish as rapidly as possible. In the center of the big foundry a dozen molders had built, of brick and clay, an im-

The wooden patterns are now taken into the main yard and laid out on large sheets of fron or steel and after marking the metal it is cut to the line by enormous and powerful shears.

CUTTING THE PLATES.

These plates, of which there are many hundreds, are numbered where they join together. On their way to where the vesse lays, upon which they go, they are punched along the edges with holes where they will be riveted together. Thus, plate after plate is set in position and the ever-lasting clatter and clank of the rivet-er's hammer begins. The little hot rivets scarcely appear outside the small holes in the plates, whence they are pushed from the inside by another "team," when their ends are flattened and trimmed by the bright stee hammers of those on the outside. It is curious to watch
