MORRIS' THE FAIR.

Thus far this winter Saturday night was the coldest, the mercury reaching four below zero. Two below was the coldest of the winter up to that date. Snow to make some people think we had sleighing, fell Friday night and Saturday, and quite a number of sleighs were seen upon the streets Saturday and Sunday.

THE unsetting of the two Republican members was done when no quorum was present, the alleged report of the committee was entirely irregular, and the supreme court is going to be asked to declare all acts of the senate, after February 24, to be void. Our new charter bill must pass through that body yet before it will be of any value to us.

WHEN the Common Council wrote Mr. Blackmer, last week, that his bid for drafting the specifications and plans for the dam was too expensive at five per cent. of the cost of the dam and \$25 per day, they were laboring under a misunderstanding of the meaning of his offer, as has since been learned. What he since writes is that for five per cent. of the cost he will make the specifications and oversee and take the entire management of the construction from first to last, looking after the details. The specifications alone will be much cheaper, and will probably be ordered made at once.

THE village of Buchanan has a great amount of important business in prospect for the coming year. If the dam is to be built it means the expenditure of a large amount of money, and that always demands good, practical, business tact on the Common Council. If that enterprise be tackled by the village, it will not be the correct thing to nominate a man for a position on the Council simply because he lives in a certain part of town or because he happens to stand in with the boys by being a jolly fellow. It is business capacity that is needed there now.
