





Negotiations for this move have future, after which the Institute eben going on several months, or since about the time of the failure to secure the Vandalia railroad, for which Mr.

Barnes labored so anxiously, and the arcangement for the free sidetrack and free switching closed with the C. &~WM. Co. last November. The institutionhas grown from a small beginning, and but few realize how it came to be here, but they now employ an average of sixty persons and pay out about \$400 a week for labor. A short time ago they could have been fastened here for \$3,000 to be invested in buildings, a permanent improvement to the town, and if Buchanan secures another as good factory it is likely to cost nearer \$30,000. While we glory in the goahead enterprising methods of our neighbor town, we prefer to see them operate upon some other town. The loss of this factory will be a bad stroke for Buchanan, which will be most fully appreciated when they have been gone a year.



#### Students' Credit in Paris.

The Parisian tradespeople who have to do with the students are not lenient. The lower French classes, every one knows, are grasping. In Paris they are spurred on by what Alphonse Daudet so graphically calls "la peur de ne pas arriver"-the fear of not "getting there." In the Quartier a student is allowed 150 francs credit; in other words, thirty dollars. If any expenditure is run up above that limit, or rent permitted to stand beyond that sum, the hussier appears and the student is literally turned out on the pavement. I have recently heard of several cases where this limit had been reached within a franc or two, and where the student, a man or woman, had been reduced to keeping the vital spark alive by one or two cups of coffee

In one instance the person was a New England girl from a small village, who, entirely without talent, had come over, as I have described, with about \$200, out of which, her passage being deducted, she had been able to live, after a fashion, for a time. The last cent was now gone; she was friendless, without means to get home, and probably too proud to make her destitution and failure known to her family, against whose instincts of common sense she had probably undertaken this venture, lured by all maaner of wild and unfounded hopes. The Speed of That Yankce Meteor. Professor H. A. Newton, of Yale writes the following letter with regar to the great and wonderfully brilliant meteor which was seen here in Hartford:

The brilliant meteor that you describe in your issue of Feb. 24, and which was heard to explode with tremendous noise in many places in Maine, appears to have been moving northward, nearly over Portland, Me., perhaps from as far south as Boston, and to have disappeared some miles above the surface of the earth over the middle or northern parts of Franklin county, Me. So far as known no stones have been secured from the meteor. If this is the true path, the body entered the air with a tremendous velocity.

The earth was at that time moving eighteen miles a second directly toward the point from which the meteor was coming. According to accepted theories. the meteor was moving faster than the earth, and the stone entered the air with the sum of the two velocities. This makes a velocity of more than forty miles a second. In most of the cases where stones have been secured the velocities have been not more than twenty miles a second. In one instance, however, in Stanhem, Moravia, there were secured a large number of stones from a meteor whose velocity was as great as that of the meteor of Feb. 23.-Hartford Courant.

Time for Early Garden Work. Tree and vine pruning should be completed before growth commences. Peas for an early crop need to be got in as early as the ground can be worked. The wrinkled, or sugar peas, should be held until the ground warms a little. Those intending to raise onions by the new plan of starting the seeds in cold frames

should have everything in readiness and get the seed in early, and have the young plants in readiness to set out as soon as the ground can be put in good order. The advantages claimed by this method are full rows a longer season of growth and less expense in cultivating and keeping clean, the expense saved in the last item making up for the extra cost of

transplanting. A much greater yield is claimed for the method. But no time is to be lost in preparing the soil for onion seed to be sowed in the rows where the crop is to grow. The preparation and sowing cannot be done too soon. The seeds of lettuce and early cabbage, cauliflower, celery, tomatoes and radish will need sowing at intervals as required, and the hotbeds and the forcing pits

will command daily care. Seeds of biennial and parennial flowering plants can be put in at once. Sweet peas in the open ground should be planted at the earliest opportunity; they should make their best growth in the only \$1,000 per annum is paid for the cooler weather of the spring.


