AN ACT. To Reincorporate the Village of Buchanan and to Repeal all acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act.

ARTICLE I. OF THE BOUNDARIES OF SAID VILLAGE. SEC. 1. The People of the State of Michigan Enact, That all the tract of country situated in the county of Berrien, and State of Michigan, being in the township number seven south of range eighteen west, and described as follows:

SEC. 2. Notice of the time and place of holding said election, and of the officers to be elected, shall be given by the President of the Village of Buchanan, by publication in a newspaper published in said village, at least five days previous to the day of holding such election.

SEC. 3. All by-laws, ordinances and resolutions of the village of Buchanan as heretofore incorporated, not in conflict with the provisions of this act, shall continue in force until repealed.

SEC. 4. All by-laws, ordinances and resolutions of the village of Buchanan as heretofore incorporated, not in conflict with the provisions of this act, shall continue in force until repealed.

SEC. 5. The present officers of the village of Buchanan shall continue in office with the same powers and duties as are conferred by law upon like officers, until their successors shall be elected and qualified pursuant to the provisions of this act.

SEC. 6. In case officers of said village are not elected at the time designated in section two of this act, notice being given as provided in section three of this act, the President of the village shall call an election for officers in said village on the first day of the month next following the day of the holding of such election.

SEC. 7. All taxes which were assessed in the village of Buchanan for the year eighteen hundred and ninety, and which have not heretofore been collected or paid, shall be reassessed on the assessment roll of the village of Buchanan for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-one.

SEC. 8. The said village as incorporated shall possess all the property and rights and be subject to all the liabilities and obligations of the village of Buchanan as heretofore incorporated.

SEC. 9. All former acts relating to the Village of Buchanan, inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed and said village of Buchanan shall be subject to and governed by the provisions of the general law of this State, entitled "An act granting and defining the powers and duties of incorporated villages," approved April first, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and the acts amendatory thereof.

ELECTION.

The village election, Tuesday, was a tame affair, as is always the case when attempt is made to run any kind of union combination. 301 votes were cast, against 451 at the election last year. This year the two parties had separate tickets, excepting on Trustees and President. Of these there were four Republican trustees and the Democrats had two trustees and president on both tickets. On Monday a run was made against Lelroy Dodd, Republican candidate for trustee, the Democrats pitting W. F. Runner's slips over his name, so there were only 28 straight Democrat tickets, to 55 straight Republican and 27 straight Prohibition. The new village organization is now completed, and it will be in order to see whether the river is to be dammed or not. There are certain legal matters to be effected which require advertising before the June session of the Board of Supervisors, if the work is to be done during the summer of 1891, and the time is not long.

In the Workman, the official paper of the Michigan Federation of Labor published at Grand Rapids, we find the following:

Mr. Williams has bought the Wenger farm of 100 acres, on the Gallen and New Carlisle road, for which he pays \$5,000.

THE Three Oaks Quill has just put in a Campbell two revolution press, which is probably worth as much money as any two other cylinder presses in the county. The press is a large one put in for jobbing purposes. Its purchase shows that its purchaser is a hustler, and that kind of men succeed in this county.

A CORRESPONDENT in the Benton Harbor Banner asks for an inspector of weights and measures for that village, complaining of short weights in groceries and short cords of wood. It is a mean way of stealing, to sell 16 pounds of sugar for \$1, and then weigh out and deliver 15 pounds, and if Benton Harbor groceries do that kind of business, the correspondent cannot be blamed for protesting.

WHEN J. J. Burns came here he contracted to convert the St. Joseph Valley road into a standard gauge road and extend it, and was to give the owners of the mortgage \$10,000 of the bonds of the new road in consideration of the discharge of the mortgages. When Mr. Burns had spread the narrow gauge light rails he asked for the mortgages and was refused. Suit was instituted to compel the discharge of the mortgages, which is now under consideration by the Supreme Court, and on this decision depends the future of the road, as it will throw possession either in the hands of the mortgages, or the present managers at Berrien Springs.

In this paper will be found the bill just passed by the legislature reincorporating the village of Buchanan, placing the village government under the provisions of the general laws for the government of villages, found in Howell's annotated statutes, a form of charter that is being quite generally adopted by villages in all parts of the State, and which is perhaps as good a charter as has been devised. In the bill of incorporation there is a clerical error in describing the small plat of territory added to the north side of the village, to include the proposed improvements, but action has been taken to promptly correct this while the legislature is in session. Those who compare the description in the bill with the Graves map, may be led into the belief that an error had been made on the west, but it is the map which is incorrect, there being 270 acres within the village limits not shown to be so by the map; which we suppose to be a copy of the plat which is on record at Berrien Springs.

MORRIS' THE FAIR.
