P.T. Barnum, the world's greatest showman, died at his Bridgporte, Connecticut, home Tuesday, aged 81 years.

Superintendent Newkirk, of the State School, at Coldwater, handed his resignation to the board of control, and they have refused to accept it. It is now time for that board of control to step down and out. Newkirk was guilty of frequent violations of law in his management of the school, the last of which led to the murder of Nellie Griffin. Such democratic strongholds as Hamilton county and Cleveland, Ohio, Jackson and Albion, in Michigan, have elected Republican Mayors, and the general result shows that in a very short time the country is tired of democracy in power. Michigan elected a full Democratic ticket by majorities ranging from \$000 upwards, last fall, and now the state has gone Republican by 3000 to 5000.

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Housing Work People.

At the twenty-fourth annual general meeting of the Artisans', Laborers' and General Dwellings company (limited) the report showed that the income for the year 1890 amounted to more than £130,000, the net revenue being £85,000, out of which dividends amounting to £54,604 had been paid. The increase of capital during the year had been £110.-100, with premiums amounting to £14,-407; the total amount paid up to Dec. 81 was £1,757,500, the authorized capital being £2,000,000 in ordinary shares and £750,000 in preference shares, 41 per cent. The revenue and capital reserves now amount to £83,149.

The completed estates of the company in London are Shaftesbury park, S. W.. and Queen's park, W., comprising nearly 3,500 separate houses. At Noel park, N., at the close of the year 1,23S houses had been built, nearly all being let and occupied. This estate when completed will comprise 2,300 houses. An estate of sixty-six acres had been acquired at Streatham, and would be developed in the same manner as the other suburban parks of the company.

Block buildings have been erected in Lesson grove, Shepherd's place, Grosvenor square, Carpenter street, Berkeley square, Coldbath square, Rosebery avenue, Seymour place, East street, Marylebone and Rosoman street. Nine hundred and fifty-two tenements, comprising 2,278 rooms, had been let as soon as they were ready for occupation. Uther block buildings are in progress at East street, Marylebone, Shepherd's place, Grosvenor square and Rosoman street and Skinners street, Clerkenwell. The company would, when work now

in hand was completed, provide accommodation for some 70,000 persons. The houses and tenements were fully let, and the loss from arrears was exceedingly small. Mr. Farrant, deputy chairman, gave a full detailed statement as to the progress of the various properties of the company completed and in course of development, and referred to the appreciation of the buildings shown by the occupiers and the care taken to select the most suitable tenants. After replying to questions put by shareholders the report and accounts were adopted and a dividend of 5 per cent. declared.-London Times.

Armstroug and Booth.

Dr. Armstong, who died in Atlanta a few days ago of apoplexy, led a peculiar-ly romantic career. For years he furnished newspaper correspondents with material for wild stories, and numerous efforts were made to prove that he was identical with J. Wilkes Booth, who assassinated Abraham Lincoln. James H. Payson, of Sidney, O., who is in this city at present, knew him intimately in former days, and in referring to the matter said:

Dr. Armstrong spent several years in Sydney as a United Presbyterian preacher, and was noted for his eloquence and for the theatrical methods which he employed in the pulpit. During the war he mysteriously disappeared, but came to the front a few years later as an Episconal clergyman.

He continued in the latter capacity until made the subject of two assaults by persons who believed him to be J. Wilkes Booth. He then went to Cincinnati, where he achieved through the newspapers an unenviable notoriety. For ten years nothing has been heard from him by his old associates. There is no doubt that he bore a remarkable resemblance to the assassin of Lincoln. He limped with his right leg and wore long,





Helping Electric Cars Uphill.

At Seattle there is about to be put into operation a novel method of running electric cars up steep grades. The electric railway there has a very steep grade about S00 feet long, and it has been found that the motors on the cars are inadequate to surmount the hill. To correct the difficulty a small conduit about two feet square is constructed, and in this is to run a small car as a counter balance. Two ropes will be attached to the counter balance car at the top. When an ordinary car is attached to the rope the counter balance car runs down the hill, but when the car reaches the top of the hill it runs down on the other side, and aided by the motor, it pulls up the counter balance car which is now ready to take up another car.-Boston Transcript.

The Time for Pansy Beds.

There is nothing more attractive in the early spring than a pansy bed. In order to secure blossoms early the plants must have attained a proper size under glass. It is necessary, therefore, to sow pansy seed early. Any long wooden box fitted into a sunny window in a moderately cold room. but where it does not freeze, will do for a seedbox. Be sure the earth is rich, well fertilized with thoroughly rotted compost and woodmold. leinhia Record. and that it is fine and friable, so the tiny seed can easily thrust down their

slender roots in it. Keep the earth moderately moist after sowing the seed, and in a short time the little plants will be up and growing.
